Crash Victim Discharged.

Mrs. Robert C. Tayman, who was seriously injured in the crash in which her husband and their daughter lost their lives at Julian August 23, was discharged from the Centre County Hospital, Tuesday, and was taken by ambulance to her home in Jersey Shore.

Although Mrs. Tayman is recovering slowly, a severe injury about one leg will require considerable time to heal, it is reported.

The Tayman's car crashed headlong into a concrete culvert headwall while they were on their way home from a vacation trip to Ohio. Mr. Tayman died several hours after the accident while the 13-year-old daughter was instantly killed.

Lutz Improving.

Sherman Lutz, State College pilot, injured some weeks ago when his airplane crashed into a field near the Centre Hills Country Club, State College, yesterday was reported to be recovering steadily.

Hospital attendants this week found it necessary to restrict visitors to Lutz's room, since there was so many callers that he was not getting sufficient rest.

Has Infected Jaw.

Charles Mox, aged about 21, caretaker of the Bellefonte Sewage Disposal plant, was admitted to the hospital Sunday to undergo treatment for an infected jaw, which is believed to have been caused by a tooth. Yesterday he was reported to be showing some improvement although he suffers considerable discomfort.

Dedication of Airport Draws Large Throng

aviation and the people of this great Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Thousands of air-minded persons dotted the huge airport Saturday afternoon and inspected the two runways, each 5000 feet long and 500 feet wide which can accommodate the largest army and commercial transport planes. Installation of lighting has now been completed including boundary lights, and the airport will go on 24-hour service when the construction of the power line is finished.

An ultra-high frequency radio station will be installed next year when the airport is expected to take the place of Bellefonte as well as Kyrletown whose weather bureau station will be transferred to Black Moshannon.

The foundation of the airport building has been completed and the building proper will be completed soon. An airways communication, the most modern radio and teletype station will be housed in its building. It will also have accommodations for pilots and passengers as well as caretakers quarters. Eight government employes, radio men and weather observers will be stationed at the field.

While planes coming into the field roared over head, Col. Philip Mathews, WPA Administrator, told the assemblage that as the national defense program expands, this quiet rural section may become a roaring, clanging fever spot of aviation.

Phillipsburg's first air mail pickup went off with precision immediately following the dedication when All-American Aviation, Inc., founders of the air mail pickup system which will become permanent for the Phillipsburg area soon, gave its first public demonstration of its new system which does not require permanent poles and which utilizes an automatic crank to hoist the pickup mail into the plane.

Zooming low over the field, the red pickup plane dropped a pouch of incoming mail and with a red shooting down from the rear of the plane, snatched up its Phillipsburg mail which was flown to Harrisburg.

A demonstration of how observation planes fly in coordinated formation was given by pilots in Pennsylvania National Guard planes. While the maneuvers of the planes were explained the three observation ships winged around Black Moshannon airport three times and disappeared in the distance while a huge Army transport plane soon tailed them.

Jean Gunther, piloting a small Ryan, thrilled the crowd with stunts.

Other speakers introduced by Sen. A. H. Letzler, master of ceremonies, were Leo Moerschbacher, state commander of Veterans of Foreign Wars, G. Albert Stewart, Secretary of Forests and Waters, and Jack Sommers, regional manager of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, who substituted for his superior, Colonel Hanley, who was unable to attend the dedication.

Stewart said that as much as he disliked the preparation of war he was glad "we have these God's acres for peace where men can be trained." He expressed the hope that the airport may not have to be

used for anything but for peaceful pursuits for the people and the government. Commander Moerschbacher said that the Black Moshannon airport was as fine as any field he had seen on the west coast during the inspection trip he made there, and said the dedication honored national defense as well as Americanism. Representative Kent Kane, who dubbed the airport "a haven in the wilderness," William Schwartz, acting head of the Bureau of Aeronautics, and Robert Zook, in charge of construction at the airport, were also introduced. Burgess Jack Wallin was in charge of the initial stages of the program during which the Phillipsburg American Legion drum and bugle corps drilled, and the Phillipsburg High school band played. The United Commercial Travelers octet also took part in the musical part of the program.
