Misses Ella and Miriam Forcey, of Valley Stream, L. N. Y.; and Miss Ora M. Forcey, of Buffalo, N. Y. Also surviving are the following sisters and brothers: Miss Sarah J. Waite, of Wilkinsburg; Misses Laura and Ella Waite, of Bellefonte; H. A. Waite, of Phoenix, Ariz.; and J. E. Waite, of Hazleton. Fourteen grandchildren also survive. Funeral services were held at Dale's church, Tuesday afternoon, with the Rev. Mr. Holley officiating. Interment was made in Dale's cemetery.

LOUIS ALBERT NICHOLS
Louis Albert Nichols of the Houserville Road, near Lemont, died at 7:30 o'clock Saturday morning, September 14, 1940, of a complication of diseases following a year's illness. He was 69 years and 26 days old at the time of his death. Born on August 19, 1871, at Pleasantville, he was a son of John and Lucretia Schuman Nichols. Private funeral services were held at his late home Monday night, with Rev. E. H. Jones officiating. Cremation took place at Pittsburgh Tuesday. Services also were held at Homewood cemetery chapel, Pittsburgh, Tuesday morning.

MRS. ANNA SELLERS WAY
Mrs. Anna Sellers Way, of West College avenue, State College, died at 5:45 o'clock Monday morning, September 16, 1940, of a complication of diseases following an illness of several months' duration. She was the last member of her family and a great-granddaughter of the late General Philip Benner. Mrs. Way was a daughter of Palmer Agnew and Catherine Kephart Sellers, and was born in Buffalo Run Valley on April 6, 1853, making her age at time of death 87 years, 5 months and 10 days. On January 25, 1881, she was united in marriage to Benner Wilson Way, who preceded her in death. Surviving children are: J. Gray, Agnew S., and Mrs. P. B. Meek, of State College. Mrs. Way was affiliated with the St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal church of State

College. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Koch Funeral Home, State College, with Rev. Harry P. Babcock officiating. Interment was made in the Pine Hill cemetery.

MRS. J. E. QUIGLEY
Mrs. J. E. Quigley died suddenly Friday morning, September 13, 1940, at her home in Lock Haven after having suffered two strokes the previous day. Mrs. Quigley, one of the most widely known of Lock Haven residents, had an active part in church and community activities during her long residence there. A descendant of early families of this section, she had connections throughout Central Pennsylvania. Daughter of the late Daniel Franklin Good and Helen Satterlee Good, Mrs. Quigley was born, Sarah Beebe Good, July 31, 1877, at the Good residence, Lock Haven. After her marriage October 16, 1901, to James Edwin Quigley, of Pittsburgh, she resided in Pittsburgh until her husband's death in 1915, returning to Lock Haven with her family the following year. Mrs. Quigley was an aunt of Hugh M. Quigley, East Curtin street, Bellefonte. Her husband was employed in Bellefonte when a young man. A member of the Historical Society, the Fortnightly Club and the Civic Club, Mrs. Quigley had also served as first president of the one-time Lock Haven Garden Club, which she had helped to organize, and had been a leader in planning the successful flower shows presented by that organization for several years. She was active as a member of St. Paul's Episcopal church and its subsidiary organizations. Mrs. Quigley's survivors are her six sons and daughters and two brothers. Her children are: Mrs. Donald W. Griffin, Princeton, N. J.; Mrs. John E. Murphy, Pittsburgh; Daniel Good Quigley, Montclair, N. J.; Mrs. Robert S. Mercer, Jr., Williamsport; Mrs. Montgomery H. Robbins, New York City; and James E. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon with interment in the Bald Eagle cemetery.

MRS. CAROLYN DAGGETT
Mrs. Carolyn Daggett, of East Linn street, Bellefonte, widow of the late Wells L. Daggett, died at the Centre County Hospital here at 9 o'clock Monday night, September 16, 1940, after a lingering illness with a complication of diseases. Mrs. Daggett was admitted to the hospital Tuesday of last week. Prominent in social circles in Bellefonte until the death of her husband about 20 years ago, she was a member of the Bellefonte Chapter D. A. R. and a member of the Episcopal church. Her husband for a number of years conducted the Penn Belle Hotel, then known as the Bush House. The deceased was born in Millerton, Tioga county, on December 10, 79 years ago. Fred Daniel Stover, of Aaronsburg, well known Penn's Valley mail carrier, died at 5:50 o'clock Tuesday morning, September 17, 1940, at the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte, after a short illness with a complication of diseases. Although he had been in failing health for some time Mr. Stover continued to work until last week, and was admitted to the hospital the day before his death. The deceased was a son of Benjamin and Amanda Stover and was born in Haines township on February 22, 1882, making his age at time of death 58 years, 6 months and 25 days. He is survived by his wife, the former Estella Martin, with whom he was united in marriage on September 21, 1914; two brothers, Forrest J. Stover, of Woodward, and Clarence Stover, of Penn Hall, and a half-brother and three half-sisters, Frank Stover, Millheim; Mrs. Catherine Haffley, Mill Hall; Mrs. Lotie Musser and Mrs. Verna Walters, both of Aaronsburg. Funeral services will be held at 9:30 o'clock Friday morning at the Reformed church, Aaronsburg, with the Rev. G. A. Fred Griesing officiating. Interment will be made in the Woodward cemetery.

JOHN DULLEN
Funeral services were held Saturday morning at St. John's Catholic Church, Bellefonte, for John Dullen, who died Thursday, September 12, 1940, at the home of his son-in-law, Orville Clark, of near Howard. Rev. William E. Downes officiated. Interment was made in St. John's Catholic cemetery, Bellefonte. Mr. Dullen, laborer and farmer, had been ill since suffering a stroke about two years ago. He had been an invalid for about a year and was confined to bed most of that time. Mr. Dullen, who was 79 years old, was born in Ireland April 9, 1861, a son of Michael and Catherine Rogan Dullen. His wife, the former Annie Dolan, a daughter, Mrs. Orville Clark, and two sons, John and Francis, all of near Howard, survive.

He was 73 years and 6 months old at the time of his death. Mr. Wagner was born on May 18, 1867 in Queens-town, Armstrong county, a son of Conrad and Sara Crozier Wagner. In October, 1892, he was united in marriage to Ida Bush, who preceded him in death on August 27, 1936. These children survive: Clair F. Wagner of San Antonio, Tex.; Mrs. J. R. Hall of Philadelphia, W. Gordon Wagner of Cleveland, Ohio, and Mr. Wagner of State College, also surviving is a brother, George Wagner, of Petrolia, Pa. Mr. Wagner was a member of the Lutheran church, Barnes, Warren County. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 o'clock Friday morning at the Barnes Methodist Episcopal church with Rev. MARRIED MEN DEFERRED
On the basis of this information, the men will be classified as follows: Class I (available for immediate service), class II (service deferred because engaged in essential occupation), class III (service deferred because of dependents), and

class IV (service deferred by law—legislators, judges, etc.)
Meantime, a Washing-on board will determine a quota for each state, based on the population and number of men from that state already in the army or navy. From this quota, will be deducted the number of men who volunteer for a year's training.
Enough men will then be taken from class I in each state to fill out the quota. They will be called in the order in which their numbers were drawn in the national lottery.
Each man called will receive a physical examination. If he cannot meet army requirements, he will be passed over and the next man taken.
Men in the deferred classes will not be called unless there are not enough class I men to meet the army's needs.

Boal Memorial Is Dedicated
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Owen M. Gallagher, rector of Our Lady of Victory chapel of State College, gave the invocation and benediction.
A new American flag, donated by the State College Veterans of Foreign Wars, was raised and Battery E, 166th field artillery of Bellefonte, fired a salute.
Col. Boal, who died last year, organized and equipped at his own expense the Boal machine gun cavalry troop which served the government during the Mexican border trouble. The troop, composed of 90 men from Centre, Clearfield and Mifflin counties, drilled without pay for two months before it was mustered into federal service and designated as the machine gun troop, first Pennsylvania cavalry.
