LABOR ORGANIZERS ARE FREED ON TRESPASS COUNT

A Morrisdale and a Houtzdale representative of the United Mine Workers of America were found "not guilty" Monday afternoon by Judge of the Peace James Riley at Osceola Mills on charges of trespass brought against them by Marko Oleonovsky, Edendale, coal operator. Oleonovsky charged that George Green, Morrisdale, and James LeCorre, Houtzdale, "entered upon his mining property in Rush township in violation of trespass passed thereon. The defendants contended that since a sufficient number of men working in the Oleonovsky mine had signed up with the United Mine Workers of America, they had the right to enter on the property under the Pennsylvania Labor Relations act and to bargain collectively. Oleonovsky subpoenas a section of the Penn Five coal tract in Rush township.
