DRIED MATURE ONIONS

Best time to harvest onions, whether grown from sets or transplants is after the tops have fallen over naturally and the stalks have dried well at the neck.

County Agent R. C. Blaney says that when this happens, the onions are mature or through growing and may be lifted. During dry periods there need be no hurry in lifting them, but if conditions turn wet

after the onions are mature some rot may develop or they may make a second growth.

After lifting onions, spread them on a dry floor in a single layer, or not over two layers deep, for several weeks to dry the bulbs and tops. Then remove the dry tops with shears or knife and also the loose outer onion scales or leaves. Store in well-ventilated crates or spread them out on a dry floor where there is ample air distribution.

The high points in storing onions are: well-matured bulbs, plenty of ventilation, and a cool temperature of 35 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit during winter.
