The enthusiastic card player who's brushing up on the rules of the game now that fall activities are at hand, might find it a bright idea, also, to brush up on his home lighting. So uggest the lighting specialists.

Playing the wrong card isn't al-ways to be blamed on ignorance of the rules, they point out. Sometimes

it's a matter of dim lighting or of a confusing glare on shiny cards. The hostess who makes it a point to provide attractive decks of cards, nice tallies and tempting candies, needs to give a thought to the light-

ing, too. There will probably be a dull evening ahead if she pulls up to the table a lamp whose light serves only two players at best. Worse still is the lamp shade which fails to cover the raw light from the bulbs. The resulting glare on the dummy hand

makes players twist and fidget. Or perhaps the bulbs are woesmall. Before the evening is over the players' energy will have seeped away with their efforts to

Lighting specialists, who have considered the needs of persons at play as well as at work, have given the following advice: for your games or hobbies provide a good lamp which will give not only enough light for easy seeing, but the right kind of light which is free from glare.

Their recommendations point to lamps made now by approximately sixty manufacturers over the specifications of the Illuminating Engineering Society. Some of these I. E. lamps are ideal for the game table. They give a light as soft as that on a shaded porch on a summer's day-adequate smooth light which distributes itself impartially to all four contestants and casts no uncomplimentary shadow lines on
