Peace J. Randall Miller at Millheim, Runkle entered a plea of guilty and was committed to the county jail in default of \$1000 bail. He also paid a fine on a charge of operating a car without a driver's license.

The jury impeached by Centre County Coroner Charles Shekeler of Milesburg, met early Tuesday evening at the Neff Funeral Home in Millheim, where Runkle, after listening to witnesses testify that he was driving in excess of the speed limit and over his side of the white line at the time of the accident, admitted that they were correct.

The crash occurred, witnesses said, when the Runkle car, driving toward State College, collided with a truck driven by George Holtsapple, of Frysburg, near Bealburg.

Others injured in the accident were Marjorie Lingie, Spring Mills, R. D. Floyd Vogt, Centre Hall, and Jeanette Schaeffer, Spring Mills. Miss Lingie and Vogt were patients in the hospital for a short time.

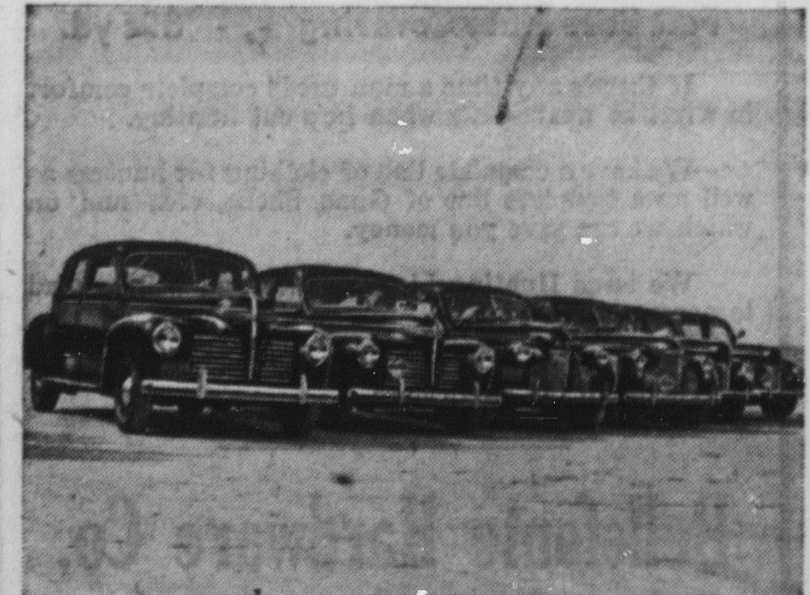
