Mr. Snavely, a son of Jacob and Maria Reacker Snavely, was born in Penn township on December 12, 1862, making his age at time of death 77 years, 9 months and 22 days. He was the last member of his immediate family. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Paradise church in Penns Valley, with the Rev. Harry A. Houseal officiating. Interment was made in the Paradise cemetery.

James Hazel, of Bellefonte, since last July a guest at the Centre County Home, died at that institution at 11 o'clock Saturday night, October 5, 1940, after a several months' illness with a stomach ailment. C.; Miss Veronica, of Hollywood, Fla.; Gordon, of Marion, Ohio, and Fred Fisher, of Bellefonte. Eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive. She was a member of St. John's Reformed church and a member of the Ladies' Aid Society of the church. Borough School Teachers Meet

E. K. Stock Speaks on Reading Practices; Group to Name Officers
A meeting of the Association of Public School Teachers of Bellefonte was held in the girls' study hall of the high school building, Monday.

The president, Miss Mary Forbes, presided. The following members were appointed by the president to serve on the nominating committee: Harold Wion, chairman; Mrs. Marie Mallory, Miss Helen Harper, Mrs. Hilda Leathers and Franklin Hoy. The officers proposed for election in December will be presented at the November meeting. The president introduced Earl K. Stock, supervising principal, who discussed the essential features of a program of reading instruction for elementary and secondary schools.

Mr. Stock defined reading as a thinking process rather than a saying of words. He said it is not a subject to be taught as an end in itself, but a tool. He classified reading as the work-type, recreation-type, and mixed-type. He illustrated the work-type or reading for information by showing a number of text books, several of which are being used in the Bellefonte schools. The recreation type is reading for pleasure while the mixed type combines reading for pleasure and information.

He emphasized the importance of the pupil's readiness to learn to read

and to advance. Not all pupils are ready to learn to read when they enter school and to force the same program on all of them before they are ready results in reading failures.

In the high school the reading program may be advanced by each teacher in his particular subject through vocabulary development, oral reading, encouragement and guidance in free reading.

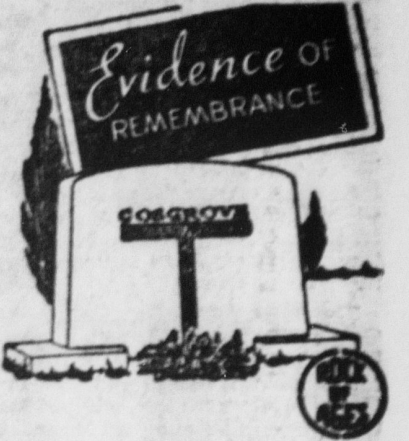
College to Conduct Registration for Draft

Under authority given by the Centre County commissioners, the Pennsylvania State College will conduct its own draft registration on October 16 for the estimated 1800 Penn State students who fall within the selective military service age limits.

Classes will be held as usual on that day, but students will be excused from any class that conflicts with their registration hour. President Ralph D. Hetzel announced. The students will register in the College Armory.

Approximately 75 members of the college staff will be sworn in to serve as registrars. The registration cards will be sent to the students' home counties, where the students then will be subject to the authority of local draft boards. The students of draft age comprise about one-fourth of Penn State's undergraduate and graduate enrollment.

Escaped Youth Surrenders
An almost three weeks' search for two escaped inmates of the Huntingdon Industrial School is half over with the Sunday night surrender of the one, George C. Haney of Williamsburg, Blair county. The youth who had hitch-hiked from Virginia, where he had picked apples for a living, resolved to give himself up while Pennsylvania motor police of the Huntingdon station were hot on his trail. The other youth, Robert Bower, of Mt. Union, with whom Haney admitted to stole four automobiles in their getaway, still remains at large.
