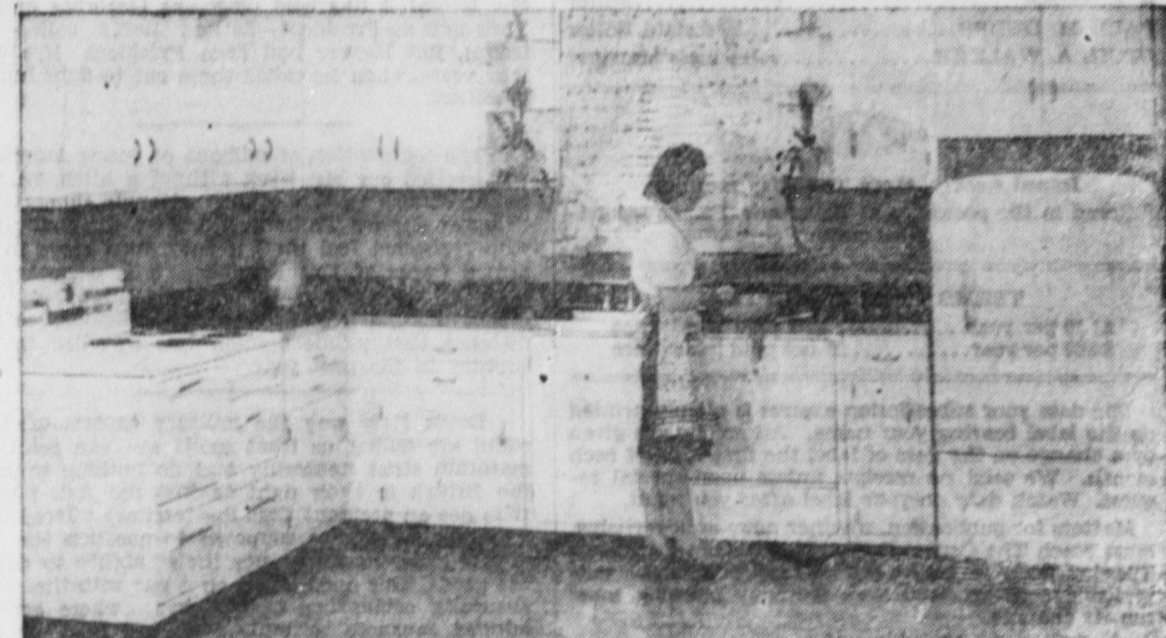
YARNELL

Imagine how easy it is to prepare a meal in a kitchen like this where one job flows smoothly into another, from refrigerator, to sink, to range. The 1940 electric range fits into this built-in type kitchen as a hand in a glove. Ranges are built to counter height to make a smooth unbroken work surface, and their gleaming white porcelain matches the cabinet finish. In this arrangement, the range is placed near the dining room door to cut down steps in getting the food from the range to the table.
