B. H. S. Suffers First Defeat

Williamsburg Downs Locals 13 to 9 in Game During Blinding Snow Storm

Outplayed by a heavier Bellefonte high team in the first half Williamsburg High school gridlers came back in the latter periods with a brilliant attack to hand Bellefonte its first setback, 13 to 9, in a game Saturday at Williamsburg.

A Williamsburg fumble on the home team's 13-yard line paved the way for Bellefonte's first quarter touchdown. The Governors recovered and were sent to the Williamsburg 3-yard line by two 5-yard penalties against the host club. Mazula went over for the touchdown.

In the second quarter Nella of Bellefonte broke through to block a Williamsburg punt, the ball rolling into the end zone for a safety. Williamsburg was on its own 10-yard line at the time.

Williamsburg came to life in the third quarter although the outlook was as dark as ever when the home team was forced back to its own 1-yard line. Kifer went back, apparently to punt, but instead he threw a pass to Bob Smith, then completed a 39-yard gain to the Williamsburg 40. On the next play Kifer, on an end around, raced 60 yards for a touchdown. Kifer's run gave Williamsburg a gain of 99 yards in two plays.

An exchange of punts in the final quarter left Williamsburg in possession on its own 40. Fonzi picked up yardage through the line. Then two passes, one to Kifer for nine yards, and one to G. Norris for 18, put the ball on the Bellefonte 13. Fonzi faked a pass and ran 13 yards for the game-winning touchdown. G. Norris rushed for the extra point.
