Enroute to Bellefonte there will be a brief stop at Pleasant Gap to enable passengers to view the fish hatchery there. The train will return to Harrisburg by way of Lock Haven and Williamsport.

CENTRE HALL FIRE CO. TO GET NEW PUMPER

The borough of Centre Hall has a very active Volunteer Fire Department. Although reorganized and incorporated only eight months ago the membership has grown from about twenty to over two hundred members. Of these, 130 are honorary members, former residents of the town.
Within three weeks a new, fully equipped truck with 500-gallon pumper and 300-gallon booster tank will arrive. It is a Darley, with cab.

This new organization held a very successful 2-day carnival in July, and November at the Centre Hall High school auditorium will be the scene of a gala Firemen's dance.
Another project of interest is the Firemen's History of Centre Hall and community, now in the course of preparation. This book will consist of two hundred or more pages, 8 x 10, and will also be a commemorative record of persons, happenings, from 1774 to the present time. A number of photographs will be reproduced, both recent and several of the early days of the town in 1882 to 1890.

Would Extend WPA Project

Payment of work before construction was begun was decided upon to protect the borough in case of a change of ownership in the properties through foreclosure or other similar proceedings. The practice is followed in many communities sponsoring such projects, it was said.

Council also authorized the filing of a request to the WPA for an extension of the program when it was reported the present project will take care of only about one-third of the requests of property owners.

In response to a request from the school board, Council granted extension of all taxes, except water and sewer rentals, to any corporation which may be established to finance the construction of a new high school building. The matter of water and sewer rentals was held for further consideration. Council has long frowned upon what it terms a useless waste of water by schools, and Monday night Councilmen claimed that the waste of water would add a needless burden to the sewer system.
