his first place of business, opened in 1888, being located on Pike street at the rear of the present Y. M. C. A. building. In 1900 he moved to a building on North Water street where the present Beezer garage now stands. Eight years later he sold his livery equipment and entered into the garage business. He remodeled the building to meet the requirements of the new business and in 1917 razed the wooden structure and built the present brick garage.

He was a charter member of the Bellefonte Elks lodge, was a member of St. John's Catholic church, and was prominently identified in many local civic and community projects.

Mr. Beezer was a son of Ferdinand and Margaret McGowan Beezer and was born at the old Beezer home along Spring Creek on August 7, 1874, making his age at time of death 66 years, 2 months, and 12 days. About the turn of the century he was united in marriage with Mary Tate, daughter of the late Col. and Mrs. B. Tate, of Bellefonte. Surviving are his widow; one son, Herbert McK. Beezer, of Bellefonte; two brothers and two sisters: William, of Philadelphia; Ferdinand, of Spring Creek; Mrs. Alle Ford, and Miss Agnes Beezer, both of Douglas, Arizona, and four granddaughters, children of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Beezer.

Upon his retirement Mr. Beezer leased his garage to the Lingenfelter Motor Company, Buick agency for the Bellefonte area.

MRS. LENA PARKS

Mrs. Lena Parks, widow of the late James Parks, of Sunnyside, Bellefonte, died at the Centre County Home here at 11:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, October 22, 1940, after a lingering illness with heart trouble and complications. Mrs. Parks, who had been living with a daughter, Ida, at Sunnyside, was taken to the County Home, Saturday. She was a daughter of Henry and Rebecca Clark Kline and was born near Bellefonte on February 8, 1866, making her age at time of death 74 years, 8 months and 14 days. She is survived by three children: Anna and Sara Parks, of Laurelton; Ida, of Bellefonte; James, of Rockview, and Frank of Bellefonte. Other survivors include a sister, Mrs. Emma Tressler, of Bellefonte. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon at the United Brethren church, Bellefonte, with the Rev. G. E. Householder officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery. Friends may view the body at the Weitzer Memorial Chapel, Milesburg, up until the time of the services.

William Malcolm Schenck, prominent citizen and merchant of Howard, died suddenly at his home in that community at 7:45 o'clock Saturday morning, October 19, 1940, after a three days' illness. Mr. Schenck, a veteran of the World War, had suffered from asthma for a number of years but had worked as usual up until last Thursday. The deceased was a son of Anson and May Long Schenck and was born in Howard on May 10, 1897, making his age at time of death 43 years, 5 months and 10 days. His father, who also conducted a hardware business in Howard, died about four years ago. Surviving are his wife, the former Mary Hoffman; two sons, Donald and John, both at home, and a sister, Mrs. Frank T. Chalk, of Philadelphia. Mr. Schenck was a former member of the Howard borough school board; was a member of the Lock Haven American Legion and the P. O. S. of A. of Howard. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Neff Funeral Home in Howard, followed by services at the Howard Methodist church, with the Rev. Wallace Cum-

ings, assisted by the Rev. L. E. Kline, officiating. Interment was made in the Schenck cemetery at Howard. Members of the Lock Haven American Legion conducted full military services at the cemetery.

MRS. W. B. HALL

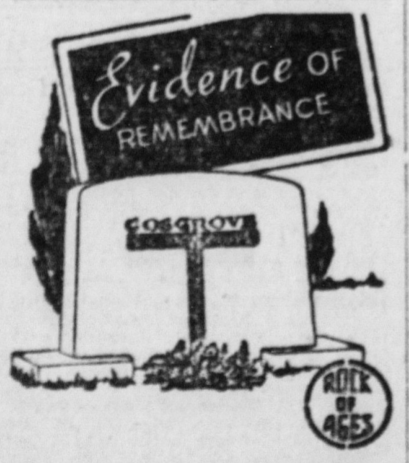

Rockey was a daughter of John B. and Henrietta Bowersox Rockey and was born at Fillmore on June 29, 1894, making her age at time of death 46 years, 3 months and 20 days. Draft Eligibles Given Numbers

No. 1, State College, Pa." Draft Board No. 2, which will serve the boroughs and townships in the northern half of the county, organized at a meeting at the Centre County Home, Bellefonte, Saturday afternoon.

Benjamin F. Nicodemus, of Port Matilda was chosen as chairman, and R. H. Shreffler, of Philadelphia, was named secretary. Harry E. Dumlup, of Bellefonte, is the third member of the board.

The board chose John F. Smith, of Bellefonte, as its clerk, and rooms at the County Home will be the board's headquarters. A fireproof vault necessary for the draft records, is available at the home.

Board No. 1, State College, reports that of a registration of 2909 in that area, the cards of 159 persons who live in other board jurisdictions have been forwarded to those boards, leaving a total of 2750 in effect in Board No. 1 rolls.

Board No. 2, Bellefonte, began with a total of 3184 cards. Of this number 161 were sent to other counties in the State, 24 to other states, and 13 to Board No. 1, leaving 2966 on the local board's rolls.

Board No. 2 officials announced that numbering of the cards will begin today, and that as soon as the numbering has been completed, the names and their corresponding numbers will be listed. Early next week copies of these lists will be posted at the Postoffice, Bellefonte; in front of the board headquarters at the County Home, and at newspaper offices.

In obtaining serial numbers assigned to them, persons who registered last Wednesday will know whether the numbers drawn in Washington will effect them.

Each board has duties to perform, imposed by law, that may or may not be pleasant. These duties are to be performed without fear or favor. Each board must show that all eligibles have registered. If, for some reason or other, this registration has been neglected, it must be taken care of before October 29. As good citizens, it is our duty to pass this word on to the delinquents, and at the same time notify the board so that their records can be completed and the prescribed steps taken against those who put themselves above or outside the law.

Already the two county boards have a number of such cases. The methods of procedure are all prescribed by law, and the law will take its course. It is very thing the boards are trying to prevent. Every eligible person must register, if he has a legitimate reason for exemption or deferment, that will be handled when the questionnaire is returned.
