SUPER-RIDE:

The only difference between riding the super-highway and a train is the means of locomotion. There are no road signs, no hot-dog stands, no cross traffic, no city or town traffic. There are no stops, except as your fancy dictates. You get on the highway and ride at your own gait. The only thing you have to be careful of is to look to the rear before pulling to the left of the lane to pass a car ahead. Super-highway motorists rarely use horns.

Travel is swift, comfortable, effortless. There is no jolting, no swerving, no swinging, no sudden stops. You are required to slow down to 35 miles an hour through tunnels, but elsewhere no one seems to care how fast you travel. You ride for 85 miles on the eastern half of the road without going through a single tunnel, and within view of only one town of any size. At infrequent intervals you come upon gasoline stations which correspond to stations on a railroad. There you find spotless comfort stations, a waiting room, and a lunch room where coffee is five cents and an ample breakfast is 25 cents. Along each side of the turnpike shoulders are a stone wire fence to keep pedestrians, wild and domestic livestock, and cars from entering the right-of-way. Once you enter the road it is almost like being in another country, insofar as the feeling of detachment from the rest of the world is concerned. But the real test of the super-highway comes when you leave it and return to the highways which up to that time you had thought were not so bad. The difference is amazing. It is like returning to coal oil lamps. For a leisurely Sunday jaunt of 250 miles, including 85 miles on the Turnpike and five of its seven tunnels, drive to Lewisport and follow Route 322 to Newport. At Newport take Route 33 to the Turnpike entrance at Carlisle. Ride Turnpike to Bedford and follow Route 220 to Bellefonte. The toll is 85 cents. This corner predicts that you'll come home with a new feeling of pride and admiration for the Commonwealth which has taken the lead in showing the world what a real highway should be like.

WATER YOUR OIL: Many motorists on the dream highway are learning an expensive lesson, according to reports from service stations at both ends of the Turnpike. Breeding along at 60 and 70 miles an hour, for hours on end, does things to the oil consumption of your car, and as a result many motorists are reported to be burning out bearings through lack of oil. Check your oil on entering the road, and if you intend to travel the entire 160 miles, an in-between check is recommended.

NO BOTHER: Somehow or other, you feel while you're on the Turnpike that someone should be bothering you more, in an official way. The only signs you see are warnings of tunnel entrances and of interchange exits. There are one or two curves indicated, but unless you're about ready to fly they can be negotiated with ease. The attendants at the entrance and exit gates have a cheerful "Good Morning," for you and your trip on the road leaves you with the impression that it's a great piece of work, well conducted.

KUSSE AGAIN: Bellefonte's Chamber of Commerce Secretary Karl Kusse claims he's found a way to joy-ride on the super-highway all day for the price of the toll between two interchanges. He would! The trouble with his system is that it's only theory. Someday, like all inventions, he'll try it out, and Chamber President Army Francis will get a long-distance phone call, collect, from Bedford or somewhere, to "come down here and bail out this screwball."

MEET NEEDS IN WINTER STORAGE OF VEGETABLES: A large number of vegetables require cold temperatures to keep properly in winter storage, but they vary somewhat in humidity requirements, according to County Agent R. C. Blaney.

Vegetables which require a moist condition of the atmosphere, or 95 per cent humidity, include cabbage, Brussels's sprouts, kale, celery, Chinese cabbage, endive, and escarole. Beets, carrots, winter radishes, rutabagas, turnips, parsnips, and salsify require medium-moist conditions, or 90 per cent relative humidity.

Onions do best in a medium-dry atmosphere of 85 per cent humidity. Free circulation of air through slatted crates helps them to keep well in storage. Winter melons may be placed under hay or straw in a medium-dry or 85 per cent humidity.
