ARMY INSTRUCTOR IS NATIVE OF CENTRE HALL

The work of Capt. William D. Reiber, instructor in the medical R. O. T. C. course offered since 1936 in the College of Medicine of Syracuse University, was featured in the Sunday, October 20 issue of Y. newspaper.

Capt. Reiber, the oldest son of Mr. Della Reiber, of Centre Hall, teaching the military phases of the course while Capt. Edward K. Reib handles the medical phases.

The Post-Standard says of Capt. Reiber: "A sergeant in the regular army and a captain in the medical administrative reserve, he has been in the Army fifteen years, having served three years in the Canal Zone and ten years at the medical field service school, Carlisle, Pa. before coming to the College of Medicine in January 1938."

Syracuse is one of only three universities in the second corps area including New York, New Jersey and Delaware authorized by the war department to offer a medical R. O. T. C. course.

This year ninety-three per cent of the students entering the medical course is voluntarily taking this additional training in army medical work.

In the first year the students get military background material, and in the second year learn about tactics and techniques of the various military units. Capt. Reiber said a typical one might be the location

of a medical battalion in combat. In the third and fourth years the course deals with preventive medicine and defense against chemical warfare.

This article was accompanied by pictures of the instructors, and the students who upon completion of the course will receive commissions as first lieutenants, medical corps reserves.
