be toward completion before the advent of winter weather. Approximately one-half mile of stone base has still to be broken near the Houersville turn on the College-Rockview highway, it is learned from the contractors. The work is being done by the Junior Red Cross float, and Harban Dairy float.

Following completion of the stone base, it will be necessary to place the base amiesite in this area and cover practically the entire stretch from the Houersville turn to Rockview Penitentiary with top surface before the road can be opened to traffic.

Since warm weather is conducive to spreading amiesite, announcement of the possible opening date of the road could not be made.
