MRS. AVERAGE CITIZEN URGES SUPPORT OF RED CROSS

Monday became the opening day for the Red Cross annual Roll Call.

I am just an average Bellefonte citizen, a housewife, but as such I have been vitally interested in the Red Cross.

Some people consider it a duty to join the Red Cross, some consider it an investment in happiness. The writer deems it a great privilege to have the opportunity to become a member of an organization whose work is so far-reaching that everyone at some time or other feels its help.

Money Stays Here

The membership is one dollar a year. Only half of this goes to the National Red Cross for the great, national work. The other half stays right here in our community for our own activities. Many people give more than a dollar, but no matter how much each person gives only fifty cents goes away from the Centre county area. In other words, if Mr. Public gives ten dollars when he is asked to become a member next week, nine dollars and fifty cents stays right here for our use.

FRANCE IN TROUBLE The French Government of Marshal Henri Philippe Petain is said to have assured the United States that France does not intend to go to War against Great Britain, to give up her fleet to Germany or to surrender French bases for the use of Germany.

The assurances, it is said, came as a result of a note from the United States reflecting the anxiety of this country over rumors to the effect that France in order to obtain release of 1,800,000 prisoners of war, might make a bargain with Hitler.

Marshal Petain is said to have reminded the United States that France is a conquered country under duress, and to have appealed for American friendship for the prostrate French nation.

It is easy to understand the difficulties that face the present French Government and its efforts to secure concessions from its conquerors. Some form of cooperation with the Germans may be inevitable. Just the same, while one may understand the necessity for French capitulation to superior arms one finds it difficult to justify the slightest willingness, on the part of France, to join in an attack upon the ally that she deserted.

There may be citizens of France who believe that cooperation with Germany will secure results for their unfortunate country. There may even be some Frenchmen who are willing to believe the words of Hitler and rely upon a pledge from the German Government. If they happen to control the French Government, it is their privilege to direct French policy in accordance with their belief, but they must not expect the people of the United States to applaud their decisions.

State College and Philipsburg spoke in no uncertain terms last Tuesday on a subject apart from party politics. On the question of Sunday movies they demonstrated they were not hungering for them, and that they had no desire for a more liberalized Sabbath Day than prevails today. Bellefonte tried it at one time and turned thumbs down on the subject. It is apparent there has been no change of attitude at this time. All of the arguments in behalf of the so-called liberalization of the day of rest do not alter the admonition to "remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy," and was never so admirably expressed as in the following lines from the bulletin of the First Presbyterian church of Northumberland, C. P. Lewis, pastor: "It is morning on the first day of the week; listen, the church bells are ringing They began with dawn, they will end with the twilight. While it is right and proper for every American to pass judgment upon every national administration, there is no occasion for them to divide into bitterly hostile groups or to permit politics to entirely overshadow the other values in life. Naturally, the victors are satisfied with the results. They are the winners, anxious for cooperation and unity. It will be necessary for the osers to practice patriotism in defeat in order that the nation may move forward in the midst of danger.

We used interpreters to explain to many of the men the idea of the Conscription Act. I am not writing this as a criticism but as additional information.
