Butchering season is just around the corner. While the Millheim area is not well supplied with real heavy porkers, one of the farmers here has some stock on the hoof that will tip the beams at or above the 500-pound mark. Among these are M. O. Stover and Harry Evans.

Centre county is one of eight Pennsylvania counties retaining higher classification as the result of the recently completed decennial census, but with the possible exception of the Judge, the present elected and appointed officers will not receive pay increases. Other counties elevated from seventh to sixth class are Bradford and Columbia.
