## STATE AGRICULTURAL GRADUATES AT WORK

With few exceptions, graduates of the School of Agriculture of the Pennsylvania State College this year have obtained employment, according to Dean S. W. Fletcher. All graduates in horticulture and landscape architecture have been placed in satisfactory positions, while additional calls for horticulturists are being received in greater than usual numbers. Poultry husbandry has had only one graduate unemployed since its first class was graduated in 1922.

Dairy husbandry graduates last June all were employed within a few weeks. Of the 48 students who completed the two-year courses in agriculture, 26 were enrolled in dairying, were definitely placed before finishing their college work.

Of the 28 graduates in agricultural engineering since 1933, all have found employment. In agricultural and biological chemistry, 29 students were graduated last June and at least 25 are employed.

Out of 12 graduates in agricultural economics, two probably are unemployed. In agronomy, 9 out of 14 found employment, but this may not mean that the others are not working, since many agronomy graduates return to the home farm. Eleven graduates in a class of 13 in animal husbandry are employed.

Four of the five graduates in bacteriology were placed, while in forestry, which has the largest enrollment of the agricultural departments, 79 were graduated and at least 64 found jobs. All but five of the 50 rural education graduates obtained teaching positions.

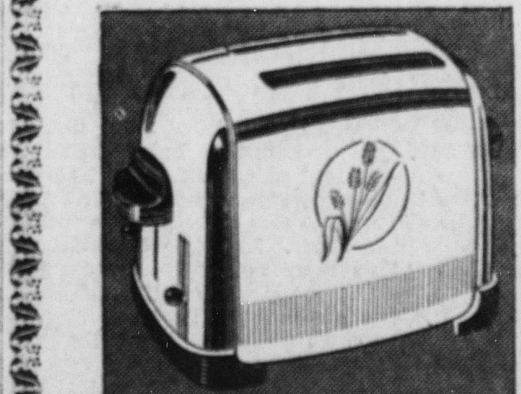

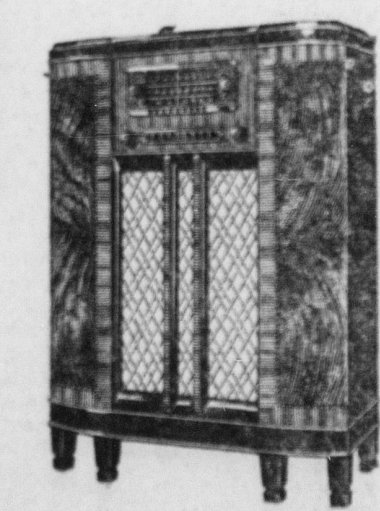
