Guards Body of Slain Hunter

Laurelton Man Under Bail; C. C. C. Workers Cut Trail To Victim

Twenty-seven-year-old Wilbur Lukens, chauffeur at Laurelton State Village, insisted Monday night upon keeping vigil personally over the body of LeRoy Keller, 28, Berks county resident, who was killed by a shot from Lukens' gun Monday. The body could not be removed from the fastness of western Union county because of the thick undergrowth in the area known as the "graveyard of the air mail."

C. C. C. boys Tuesday tolled up Buffalo Mountain, cutting a path through snow and brush so that the body could be brought from the forest. Lukens, who gave himself up for one of his party, Robert Steyers, Millmont, R. D. 1, traveled to notify nearby authorities of the fatality, is under \$1,000 bail for appearance at court. The father of three children, Lukens is reported to be a popular figure at Laurelton where he is a Sunday school teacher. Sheriff Melvin R. Goud, Lewisburg, is investigating with Privates M. L. Woodring and Edward Bouse, of the Williamsport detail of state police.

Baltimore Men Fined \$200 Each

Hunters Caught With Two Bear Cubs Monday in Lycoming County

John A. Urshbruch and Anton Frederick, both of Baltimore, may not be able to boast of being the most successful hunters in Lycoming county for the deer season, but they should come close to having the most expensive trip.

Each of them paid \$200 Tuesday morning for kills made Monday. Game protectors were awaiting them, about 6 o'clock Monday evening, when under cover of darkness they brought their kills out of the woods near Proctor. Most hunters are anxious to show what they have killed, but not the Baltimore men. They wanted secrecy and thought that they had guaranteed it by waiting for darkness.

However, the game protectors had learned what to look for, so they were on hand as a welcoming party, to the great surprise of the hunters.

Each of the men had killed a cub bear. Killing cubs is illegal. Further, there is a strictly limited season wherein bears may be killed in Pennsylvania. This year it covered four days from November 18 to 21.

The hunters didn't have with them enough money to pay the fines for their violation of the game laws. They were guests of the game protector over night. Tuesday morning they received some money from Baltimore by telegraph, each paid over his \$200 and got a field receipt. The men had paid \$15 each for non-resident hunting licenses and were lodgers at a home near Hillsgrove.

State Trooper's Son Is Struck By Truck

Hurled under its wheels when struck by a passing truck, William A. Miller, Jr., 10, of 2726 Boas street, Penbrook, miraculously escaped injury last Wednesday night.

The father of the boy, Pvt. William A. Miller, State Motor Police officer now engaged in the Taylor murder investigation at State College, said he had stopped his automobile at State and Walnut streets, Penbrook, to go to a nearby store. His son got out of the machine and started to cross the street after him. The father saw the oncoming truck and called to his son to stop, but the boy kept on coming and was struck by the machine. The impact knocked young Miller to the street and under the body of the truck where the rear wheels passed by without touching him. The child was taken to the Harrisburg Hospital where physicians said he was not injured.

Miller said the driver of the truck evidently did not know anything was wrong, because the machine did not stop.
