Carpeneto To Collect Fines

Treasurer Carpeneto declared: "I'm not anxious to take this job, but I want to understand that since it has been assigned to me every violator is going to pay. I intend to enforce the laws without fear or favor, and for violators who refuse to pay fines, informations will be lodged with a Justice of the Peace, entailing much heavier fines and costs."

Council instructed Carpeneto to be at the Council Chambers from 11 to 12 o'clock every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning, to act as magistrate in traffic cases. Police are instructed to mark traffic tickets so that violators know where and where to appear.

Councilmen lodged a complaint in regard to the manner in which the new police car is parked in the same spot, in front of the First National Bank, day and night. Councilmen expressed the belief that greater benefits would result if police would park at different locations to observe traffic and maintain a lookout for speeding and reckless drivers.

By unanimous vote, Council passed an ordinance requiring that all snow be removed from sidewalks in the borough within 18 hours after the beginning of a snow fall. The ordinance did not specify whether the tenant, or the owner of a rented property will be responsible for the removal of snow, but it provides in case of failure to comply with the ordinance, the borough will clear the sidewalks and charge the property owner accordingly.

In a letter to Council, Borough Solicitor M. Ward Fleming stated that in filing liens against owners of properties who are in arrears in water rentals it has been found that it is impossible in some cases to determine which properties are involved. To guard against filing improper liens, Judge Fleming suggested that Council require the registration of all deeds for property, or that a survey be made to determine the questions now in doubt. No action was taken at the meeting.

Council moved to correct a dangerous condition existing at the Lozan House, East Howard Street. Accumulations of snow on the roof fall to the sidewalk, endangering pedestrians. Steps are to be taken to remove the danger.

It was reported that the fire siren atop the County Jail building is in need of repairs. The matter was referred to the Fire and Police committee.

Also an adequate supply of kitchen utensils should be supplied for the jail. Ceilings in both storage rooms require repairs.

"In the jail proper we recommend that necessary repairs be made to meet State specifications. Also that adequate safe lighting be furnished. Immediate steps should be taken to rid the jail of rats. We further recommend that the Sheriff be furnished with the necessary information that he should have necessary in the jail. We commend the Sheriff and Mrs. Miller for the cleanliness of the jail and for the satisfactory service they are rendering the inmates."

The jury was much impressed with the new County Home and its equipment and commends the management for the excellent management with which the home is conducted.

The untidy condition of the Court House should be corrected. We recommend the janitor service throughout the Court House be improved. We also recommend improving the lighting system in the Court House, viz. Commissioners' office. May we suggest that several of the ceilings in the downstairs offices be examined where cracks in the plaster would indicate it is coming loose."
