Warns Against Aid To Britain

traced the history of the relations of that nation with the United States. He recalled that in the Revolution England hired the Hessians, German mercenary troops, to fight the colonists; that in the War of 1812 Great Britain stopped U. S. ships on the high seas and shanghaied their crews; that in the Civil War England wanted to recognize the Confederacy as a separate nation; that after we financed England in the World War, no attempt was made to repay the loans.

The speaker said that Great Britain now wants the United States to believe our first line of defense is England. He contended that our real lines of defense are the Atlantic and Pacific oceans; Canada to the north, and Mexico and the dominions to the south. He declared that if we as a nation devote ourselves to protecting this nation we will come upon no "sad days."

The suggested use of American ships to convey supplies to England, Judge Fleming stated, would be taken by the German Reich as an act of war. The sinking of an American ship in such service would be taken by the United States as an act of war—and we'd be in the conflict, he said.

In regard to loans, Judge Fleming said that Great Britain has tremendous gold reserves and valuable investments in this country which could be converted into credits for war materials. Such a move would eliminate the need for the United States granting loans. "Why should we loan money to a nation that has sufficient resources?" Judge Fleming asked.

Other speakers included: Mrs. William Jones, State President of the V. F. W. Auxiliary, who urged greater membership activity in the Bellefonte Post; James J. Leitze, of Bellefonte, commander of the Bellefonte Post, and State Commander Leo Moerschbacher, of Phillipsburg, who urged V. F. W. members to remember the organization's great objective—"To speak up for Democracy."

The toastmaster was introduced by W. W. Hampton, service officer

AAA Discuss Nation's Defense

with the interrelation of various sections of the country, interdependence of agriculture with labor and industry, and methods which could be employed to expand the consumption of food as a health defense measure as well as a means of expanding the farmer's market, Mr. Rishel stated.

Two farmer committees summed up the conference work in reports on "Agriculture's Part in Defense," and "Agricultural Welfare."

The committee considered shifts in production which will come as a result of the loss of much of the export market, specifically recommended expansion of the food and cotton stamp plans, reducing in distribution costs, continued emphasis on conservation, and fair returns to labor as methods of protecting agriculture and developing national unity for defense, Mr. Rishel stated.

Other specific recommendations included construction of a gasoline line from the West to New England, and the storage of grain surpluses on the eastern seaboard as defense measures for the northeast area.

Full reports of the conference will form the basis for carrying out the AAA program in the northeast during 1941. Mr. Rishel stated.
