Borough Cracks Down on Laws

friends and foe alike, spoke feelingly yesterday of the splendid spirit with which those who have received tickets for parking violations have been paying their fines.

His statement on law enforcement follows:

"In order to accommodate as many shoppers as possible the Borough will strictly enforce the following regulations in the future:

Two-hour parking limit.

Double parking.

Obstructing the free flow of traffic in any manner.

"If the two-hour parking ordinances were not enforced the spaces would be taken up by certain individuals the entire day and out-of-town shoppers could not be conveniently accommodated.

"This will apply to all, regardless of whether they are visitors or local residents.

"The penalty for violating any of the above regulations is a fine of \$1.00 for the first violation and \$2.00 for each subsequent violation, together with costs.

"Anyone caught bending, twisting, defacing or interfering with any traffic sign or street flare in any manner will be prosecuted under State Law, the penalty for which reads as follows: Upon summary conviction before a magistrate, a fine of not less than \$25, nor more than \$100, and costs of prosecution or ninety (90) days imprisonment.

"Speeding on certain streets is being closely watched and will be prosecuted under State Law on the charge of reckless driving, the penalty for which is as follows: Upon summary conviction before a magistrate, a fine of \$10 to \$25.

"It also is the Borough's intention to enforce the traffic code and listed below are some of the regulations that will be closely watched most of them being punishable under State Law which reads as follows: No person shall park a vehicle or permit it to stand whether attended or unattended upon a highway in any of the following places: On a crossing; within 30 feet of existing traffic signals; within 30 feet of stop signs; within 15 feet of entrance to any fire station; or within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. In front of a private driveway; on a sidewalk; along side of any street excavation; at any place where official signs have been erected prohibiting standing or parking.

"Penalty—Upon summary conviction before a magistrate fine of \$2.00 to \$10.00 and costs of prosecution or undergo imprisonment for not more than five (5) days.

"This week the Borough began enforcement of the Ordinance regulating the size, height and width of all business signs which hang or are placed over the sidewalk.

"It is not the intent of the Borough to create a new source of revenue but rather to make driving in Bellefonte much safer and to endeavor to have parking facilities available for all.

Young Hunter Lost Overnight

Returns to His Camp After Companions Search All Night For Him

Dragging a deer behind him 18-year-old Carl Alexander, lost Allegheny county hunter, stumbled into a Clearfield hunting camp last Tuesday morning and told camp members how he survived the night in the bitter cold air by lighting a fire and lying against his deer kill to keep warm.

JOHN S. GINTER AGAIN ACQUITTED OF CHARGES

In a directed verdict by Judge E. Creps, of the Indiana court, John S. Ginter of Tyrone was acquitted Tuesday night of charges of fraudulent conversion of \$1,250 which an Indiana man claimed to have given him for investment in a meat packing company. The verdict upheld the defense contention that the commonwealth's evidence failed to sustain the two charges of fraudulent conversion of property and fraudulent conversion of partnership. Earlier Judge Creps quashed the only other charge against the defendant—false pretense.
