"Anyone caught bending, twisting, defacing or interfering with any manner will be prosecuted under State Law, the penalty for which reads as follows: Upon summary conviction before any magistrate, a fine of not less than \$25. nor more than \$100. and costs of prosecution or ninciy (96) days im-

"Speeding on certain streets being closely watched and will be prosecuted under State Law on the charge of reckless driving, the penalty for which is as follows: Upon summary conviction before a magistrate, fine of \$10 to \$25.

"It also is the Berough's intention to enforce the traffic code and listed below are some of the regulations that will be closely watched most of them being punishable under State Law which reads as folows: No person shall park a vehicle or permit it to stand whether attended or unattended upon a highway in any of the following On a crossing; within 30 feet of flashing traffic signals; within 30 feet of stop signs; within 15 feet of entrance to any fire station, or within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. In front of a private driveway; on a sidewalk; along side of any street excavation; at any place where official signs have been erected prohib-
