

# OBITUARY

## MISS ANNIE BECK

Miss Annie Beck, of Philipsburg, died Monday morning, December 9, 1940, at 9:40 o'clock in the Centre County Home, Bellefonte. Miss Beck who had been an invalid since fracturing a hip more than a year ago, was a patient in the Philipsburg State Hospital before being admitted to the home on February 10 of this year. She was born August 24, 1857, and is survived by two sisters, Miss Nannie and Miss Love Beck, both of Philipsburg. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon in the parlor of the Methodist church, Philipsburg, in charge of her pastor, Rev. Walter H. Williams. Interment was made at Philipsburg.
