Hundreds Of Toys To Be Distributed

Candy And Oranges to be Distributed to Children at Noll's Grove

Children of more than 150 needy families in Bellefonte and vicinity will not be forgotten on Christmas Day when Santa distributes toys. For in two large workrooms in the basement of the Y, and the other sponsored by the junior section of the Bellefonte Woman's Club, with workrooms on the third floor of the Bush Arcade building, are no trilling undertakings.

Each group collected an estimated total of more than 600 toys, and each group is preparing to furnish toys, candy, and other gifts to children of some 75 families, which are made up of from 1 to 14 children each.

Today both workrooms are heavy with the odor of fresh paint. On long tables, and ranged along the floor are hundreds of toys and games, all restored to working condition and all gleaming under their new paint. There are many large cardboard boxes, each one bearing the name of a family, and containing an assortment of toys suitable for the children in that family.

In some there are shoes for the kiddies. In others there may be a coat or sweater. The items in each box are chosen to fit the needs of the individual family insofar as is possible.

The Y. M. C. A. project was carried out with the aid of four National Youth Administration workers, who became quite expert at toy repairing while on the job. Toys were contributed by individuals throughout Bellefonte, the Junior Red Cross of the Bishop street school collected a large number of others. The C. G. Murphy Co. donated a number of cans of paint for use in painting the toys. Although some 600 toys have been received and repaired, the Y. still has need for some additional toys.

Today cards will be mailed to the various families who are to receive boxes, and the families are asked to call at the Y. for them Friday or Saturday.

Mrs. C. Brooks Binns is chairman of the committee in charge of the Woman's Club toyland, in the Bush Arcade. The American Home section of the club donated a number of new toys, and the Shaffer stores, the Weis Pure Food store and the A. & P. stores donated candy to include in each box. In addition the Girl Scouts of Bellefonte contributed 70 boxes of candy.

The toys were collected and repaired by members of the junior section, aided by Donald R. Everitt, local druggist, who used his delivery car to gather many of the contributions.

Boxes to needy families are to be delivered Monday afternoon by trucks donated for the purpose by the West Penn Power Company and the American Lime and Stone Company.

The two groups have worked in cooperation with each other in preparing lists in order to avoid duplications.

Anyone who has visited the two toy repair rooms cannot fail to be impressed with the scope of the task and the painstaking manner in which toys were overhauled to make them like new. But the effort will be well repaid when hundreds of local youngsters who otherwise would have a sad Christmas, will have dolls, scooters, wagons, games, wheelbarrows, mechanical toys, soldiers, tanks, musical instruments and scores of other articles to prove to them there really is a Santa Claus.

Did you ever see a dozen of chicken eggs that weighed 4 pounds? We didn't either, but yesterday we saw one egg, which if there had been 12 of them would have weighed that much. (This isn't an English lesson so don't be touchy about the sentence structure.)

The egg was displayed by L. W. Peters, Mingoville poultryman, who has about 600 White Leghorn chickens. He supplies hatching eggs to the Hecla Poultry Farms during the hatching season, and ships about 8 cases a week to the New York market at other seasons of the year.

It was the largest egg Mr. Peters has ever seen, and he sees more than a million eggs annually. The giant, believed to contain two or maybe three yolks, weighed exactly 3 1/2 ounces. It measured 7 inches in circumference the short way and 9 inches the long way. The hen no doubt laid it the hard way.

The court appointments were made from a list of 12 persons, 6 Republicans and 6 Democrats, suggested to Judge Walker by Howard citizens.

Gregg Township Organization Holds Christmas Party; Reviews Year's Work

Election of officers and the distribution of Christmas gifts to the kiddies featured a meeting of the Gregg Township Civic Club at the Spring Mills school auditorium Wednesday night of last week.

Harry A. Corman was re-elected president and Tibbons Zubler was re-elected secretary of the organization. New officers chosen were: Homer Pettehoff, vice president, and Russell Condo, treasurer.

Members to the executive committee were: John W. Decker, B. G. Meyers and C. B. Stover. Other committees will be named at a meeting to be held Wednesday, January 8.

Approximately 250 men, women and children were present at the Christmas party, the Gregg Township Civic Club being the only one of its kind in the county which has memberships for both men and women.

A report of work completed during the past year includes the payment of \$200 to the fund for lighting the streets of Spring Mills. This amount represents one-half the total cost of street lighting, the other portion being met through a 2-mill tax levy.

The year 1940 also saw the erection of a 12 by 30 foot building on the athletic field for festival purposes, and a number of needy children provided with medical care or with eyeglasses, out of the club's treasury.

It was decided to hold the annual carnival early in July.

Council Holds Routine Session

51 Violations Issued; Only 27 Have Been Returned, Report Shows

Bellefonte Council at a regular meeting Monday authorized the purchase of a new water main tapping machine to replace one worn out by nearly 30 years of service. The expenditure will total approximately \$38.

Tapping machines are used in tapping mains without turning off the water. Police reported having issued a total of 54 parking violation tags, but so far only 27 have been returned and the fines paid, according to a report by George Carpeneto, the new filing agent for the borough. Other fines and forfeits totaled \$29.50.

A request by the school board for borough authorities to eliminate parking on the Academy driveway was denied by Council. It was believed that if Council should police the drive, the borough would be responsible in the event parked cars kept fire equipment from access to the Academy in case of emergency. Dunlap street was reported to be in deplorable condition, but Council dropped the matter after a brief discussion. The police report showed that 54

cars had been tagged for violations of the parking rules; 1 arrest for larceny; 4 for disorderly conduct; 4 investigations made; 2 stop-sign violations; 9 persons incarcerated in the lock-up; 1 accident investigated, and 3 purse-snatching attacks, by unknown persons.

The Health Officer's report showed that nine eating places had been inspected and health certificates issued to 47 persons employed in those establishments. Council refunded a \$5 fine collected from a CCC-truck driver for a violation of a stop-sign on Lamb street. The youth paid costs totaling \$2.50 and since he was a first offender, it was believed that the additional fine would be a great hardship for him.

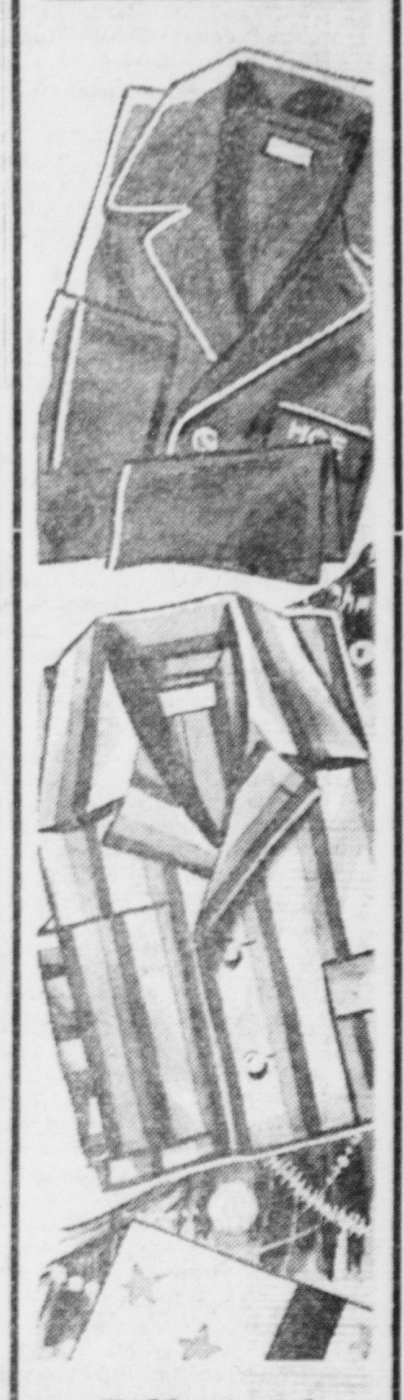
