Hundreds of thousands of birthday greeting cards in which coins may be inserted and coin collection boxes will soon be distributed, Mr. Morgan said. The "March of Dimes of the Air" headed by Eddie Cantor, star of screen, radio and stage, this year will attract the most brilliant list of celebrities since the war against infantile paralysis began. Grantland Rice, writer and widely recognized sports authority is planning a rull program for the Sports Council which he heads. In Washington, D. C., Former Commissioner George Aiken again heads the "Mile-O-Dimes" program. At National Headquarters in New York, Mr. Morgan and Colonel D. Walker Wear, Assistant National Chairman, are completing final details of the concerted nation-wide drive. Joseph M.
