He was a son of Charles and Elizabeth Beechler Witmer and was born in Benner township on March 8, 1865, making his age at time of death 75 years, 9 months, and 11 days. Surviving are his wife, the former Lila Markley, and one brother, A. W. Witmer, of Buffalo Run Valley. Funeral services were scheduled to be held at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon at the United Brethren church, Bellefonte, with the pastor, the Rev. G. E. Householder, officiating. **PLANE:**

So how do they get great swarms of planes safely on the ground in pitch darkness? Does anyone have the answer?

**CORN:**  
After January 1 when you switch on your radio your ears are likely to be pounded by unprecedented waves of corny music. It will be due to a war now current over music rights. The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers is demanding a fee of \$3,000,000 from the National Association of Broadcasters for the right to use over the radio music controlled by the ASCP. The fee last year was \$4,500,000, but the ASCAP contends that because radio's receipts are growing by leaps and bounds, the broadcasters should pay more for their use of the music which is largely responsible for radio's healthy growth. If the ASCP's demands are not met by January 1, the only music permitted to be given out over the air will be Latin American numbers, some hill billy tunes, American folk songs and some 200 original tunes by amateurs.
