Dorworth was brought to the offices of a Bellefonte physician where he was found to be suffering from a severe head laceration and slight concussion. He is now recovering rapidly at the family home. Motor police reported that two other cars ran off the road in the same place Christmas night but were able to continue under their own power. Christmas day was warm, clear and balmy, and temperatures were far above the freezing mark. But the section of road where ice formed from surface water is protected from the sun by mountains and trees, and is always noticeably colder than surrounding areas. Late Christmas night State Highway crews scattered ashes on the section to prevent further mishaps.

Board Passes Measures For New Building

(Continued from page one) to use the money in the present program. The board voted unanimously to pay an annual rental of \$17,000 to the building corporation to liquidate the \$300,000 bond issue the corporation will sell to finance the major cost of the structure. The rental fee is based on a tax levy of 34 mills and a \$4.09 per capita tax. The board authorized the issuing of \$16,000 in comminative bonds which was \$84,000 of insurance money now on hand, will enable the board to pay \$100,000 immediately on the structure. An offer of \$25,000 from the building corporation for the use of the building at the corner of Linn and Allegheny Streets, was accepted. This transaction gives the corporation title to the property as required before the building can be erected. The new tax levy of 34 mills is expected to be made in April or May, 1941 and will become effective at once. The estimated \$400,000 total cost of the building, furnishings and equipment is somewhat in excess of the original figures, but board members explained that since plans were first considered building costs have increased sharply. The original total cost was placed at about \$285,000. Amortization tables figured at 4 per cent, with annual payments on principal and interest of \$17,000 reveal that the corporation's bond issue of \$300,000 will be liquidated in slightly more than 22 years. The board's actions last Monday were in accord with recommendations of the Finance committee: William H. Brown, and Horace J. Hartranft, who arrived at the plan of action after a conference with Earl K. Stock, supervising principal; Muaser W. Gettig, the school board attorney, and John G. Love, attorney for the building corporation.
