Mammoth Slide Blocks Highway

Thousand Tons of Rock And Earth Fall Near Renovo; Several Narrow Escapes. A tremendous mass of rock fell over Route 120 a half mile west of Drury Run, near Renovo, shortly after 8 o'clock Saturday morning, blocking traffic on the highway, throwing rocks against a passing freight train, and narrowly missing two trucks, traveling in opposite directions, which stopped on either side of the slide just in time to escape being caught in the debris. Highway department crews, equipped with dynamite and power shovels, were at work promptly to remove the huge barrier and get rid of what looked like an equally large mass of rock and earth precariously held in place at the top of the cut from which the slide came down. There were a thousand tons of rock piled up on the road, spectators from the westbound freight train, and a considerable depth and ran over to the very edge of the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks paralleling the road. Observers report that some of the slabs of rock lying across the road measured six feet by six by twenty feet. State Motor Patrolmen, Lock Haven and Emporium were in charge of diverting traffic which went from Westport and Drury Run via Hammerley Fork. Drivers of the two trucks congratulated themselves on a narrow escape, shared by the crew of a dozen motor coaches, carrying a train which passed the scene of the slide just as the rock came down. An automobile trailer truck, with a load of new cars, was coming east when the driver saw the rock at the top of the cut loosen and start to fall. He jammed on his brakes and backed, getting out of the way of the slide just in time, as smaller rocks fell past his cab. A similar narrow escape was that of a group of men in a truck owned by John Redis, of South Renovo. Driven by Mr. Redis' son, with a group of miners enroute to Renovo from Barmen, this truck passed the site of the slide, running through a puddle of water which splashed through the floor board when they heard a roar behind them and turned to see the side of the hill collapsing in the rear. Flying rocks fell into the rear of the truck. The freight train, traveling on the westbound track, nearer the highway, traveled through a rain of flying rocks, but fortunately none of them were large enough to derail the train, though they fell into the empty cars and battered the locomotive somewhat. The train was not seriously derailed, however, and kept on going to get out of the danger zone quickly. The presence of the train probably kept some of the rock off the track. Traffic piled up promptly with ten or a dozen vehicles held up on each side before there was time to do anything about controlling the confusion. The site of the slide is the place known as "White City" at Dry Run hollow, where the sides of the highway cut are almost perpendicular and rise above the road. There was another heavy slide there earlier in the year. The rain of the last couple of days apparently had loosened the large crags so that the side of the cut gave way as if the bottom had been knocked out from under it.

Albert Grove Wins Elmira Xmas Contest

An exterior lighting display at the home of Albert W. Grove, of 330 Glenwood, Elmira, N. Y., was judged the grand winner from among 56 entries in the Junior Association of Commerce Home Lighting Contest at Elmira, Thursday night. Grove, a son of Mrs. D. A. Grove, of East Linn street, Bellefonte, designed and aided in erecting prize-winning displays at the Grove residence here before going to Rochester. Highlight of the Rochester display, somewhat similar to displays at the Grove home here in former years, is a spray of mist which reflects the colored lights of an evergreen arch extending from two fir trees flanking the sidewalk of the Grove home. Blue lights run from the street to the arch and two other lighted evergreen trees frame the display. The judge announced that their choice was made because of the water effect and the uniformity of the lighting. Mr. Grove will receive an electric roaster-oven valued at \$35. Slight Fire at Coleville.
