Man Sentenced for Dynamiting Home

Marshall E. Hamer, Jr., 29, of Tyrone, who pleaded guilty in Blair county court Monday to setting off four sticks of dynamite at a Tyrone home last October 20, was sentenced by Judge Patterson to serve a term in the Western penitentiary of from one to two years.

Evidence against Hamer showed that on the night of October 20 he visited the home of James McMullen in Tyrone and placed four sticks of dynamite against the building, attached a fuse, lighted it and got in his car and drove nearby waiting for the explosion. The McMullen home and several adjoining houses were badly damaged, including an automobile that was parked against the house.

Hamer's actions, it was alleged, was the result of his separation from his wife who was staying in the McMullen home. It is believed that while under the influence of liquor, Hamer became angered at his wife's refusal to return to him, and took his revenge by dynamiting the house.
