Youth Held On Forgery Charge

Nevin F. Auman, an 18-year-old boy, native of Pleasant Gap and who lives with his mother at Lock Haven, was picked up at Jersey Shore Friday morning by Police Chief George M. Slifer and taken to Lock Haven to face a charge growing out of the boy's unsuccessful attempt to pass a fraudulent check there.

Lock Haven police, who got on the boy's track when he tried to pass a check for \$15.75 at the Montgomery Ward store, had furnished Chief Miller with a description of the boy and an address in Jersey Shore where they thought he might go to visit relatives.

Officer Ryan, who had aided in the investigation, mentioned the case to Officer James Griffith of the State Motor Police detail at Rockview, and the state officer said that the boy is wanted in Centre county on a similar charge.

The youth had written the check on the account of the "Slime Furniture Co., and had misspelled the name Slime also in the signature. This fact aroused the suspicions of the Montgomery Ward assistant manager, who called the police. In the meantime the boy disappeared.

Taken before Alderman Allen Sterner, and questioned by Clinton County District Attorney Burritt L. Haag, the youth entered a plea of guilty to attempting to pass a check which he admitted he had forged. He was remanded to the Clinton County Jail for the January term of Clinton County court when he will be sentenced.

STATE ORDERS ALTOONA TEACHER REINSTATED

The state ordered Tuesday the reinstatement of Miss Iva G. Batus, Altoona High school teacher, who was dismissed after it was disclosed that she had obtained a license to sell beer.

Dr. Francis B. Haas, superintendent of public instruction, reversed the action of the Altoona school board. She had been discharged for "engaging in a business incompatible and inconsistent with the office of a teacher in the public schools."

William H. Otts Wedded 50 Years

Epiphram K. Keller, of Axemann, were united in marriage at the bride's parental home at 11 a. m. on January 15, 1991, with the Rev. Mr. Troschke, then pastor of the Pleasant Gap Lutheran Church, performing the ceremony.

At the time of their marriage, Mr. Otts was employed as a school teacher, and he and Mrs. Ott went to housekeeping at Axemann. After seven years, during which time Mr. Ott taught in the Spring township schools, they moved to Bellefonte where he entered the carpentering trade. For 30 years they lived in a home on Bishop Street, and 18 years ago purchased the house in which they now reside.

Mr. Ott, who will be 79 years old in February, and Mrs. Ott, who is observing her 74th birthday today, are faithful members of the Bellefonte Reformed Church. Both have always enjoyed exceptional health. Mr. Ott is a member of the I. O. O. F. and of the now disbanded Knights of the Golden Eagle. Mrs. Ott is a member of the Rebekah lodge.

Their union was blessed with one child, a son, Harry Ott, who was one of the many victims of the great influenza epidemic during the World War in 1918. Ott contracted the disease while in a U. S. Army camp and died a few days later.

Mr. Ott has three brothers and three sisters: David Keller, and Mrs. John Garbrick, both of Bellefonte; Martin Keller, Mrs. Ralph Noll and Mrs. Dallas Smeltzer, all of Pleasant Gap; and Paul Keller, of Philadelphia. Mr. Ott has two brothers, and four sisters: Alfred Ott, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; J. W. Ott, of Williamsport; Mrs. Elizabeth Ripka, of Williamsport; Mrs. Sara Strausser, of Williamsport; Cora Rothrock, both of DuBois, and Mrs. Jennie Green, of Proersertown.

Fiftieth anniversaries are no rarity on the side of the Ott family, at least Mrs. Ott's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Epiphram Keller, of Axemann, celebrated their 50th anniversary, and 15 years later celebrated their 60th anniversary—which is something of a record as anniversaries go.

Last night a group of close relatives arrived unannounced at the Ott home, the surprise being planned as part of the anniversary celebration.
