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CENTRE COUNTY'S ORE MINES

This bank lies 1/2 mile north east of the Ross bank. It is a very old bank and had been idle before 1883. Whether it was operated afterwards is not known. It was a deep level and about 600 feet in circumference, and the greatest depth was 100 feet. A washer was built here with an incline plane. The washer cleaned between 25 and 40 tons a day. There was a drift in the north east face at the bottom of the pit which ran a considerable distance and extended them by cross gangways east and west. Mule cars were run into these drifts. The Howard Furnace spoke well of this ore and said it worked well in their furnace.

This bank is located a little over a mile east of Howard bank. It had been idle for quite some time, the last lessee being Curtin Bros, who abandoned it in 1881. There were two small pits here but they did not show very much working. The first work done here was by the owner Veneda, who put down a shaft 80 feet passing through pipe ore 10 feet thick. Where Mr. Veneda sold his ore is not known but to the Howard or one of the other nearby furnaces. The Curtin Brothers operated this bank a few years on a lease of 80 cents a ton to which they took out a few thousand tons of ore. The ore was washed here in a single shaft horse washer with water brought up from a small stream along the ridge.

This mine was on the Henry Snavely property about 1/2 of a mile north of Nittany Post Office. It was first worked for Washington Furnace many years ago, and some years later a Scranton firm operated it. They put down a 60-foot shaft, the ore being raised by horse-power winding a rope around a large drum. There was no washer here but a good location for one. The mine was about 50 feet from Fishing Creek, and a good supply of water with a small pump could be had.

The Barlow and Day mine was situated in the next field. It was originally opened by Henderson & Co. of Baltimore. It had also been worked for Washington Furnace.

There was an ore washer here with an incline plane, it was a single washer 28 feet long. A well was sunk by John Fallon of Philadelphia near the mine, and a good supply of water with a small pump could be had.

The absence of railroad communication in Penn's Valley, at this time was a hindrance to the ore mining in this valley. Otherwise the people of this vicinity could have expected a great future in the ore mining industry. The ores were clean and cheaply mined.

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URGENT NEED FOR ARMY NURSES

There is an immediate and urgent need for registered nurses for duty with the Army Nurse Corps Reserve, according to the War Department.

In January alone, it is estimated that 1,491 additional nurses will be placed on active duty in new Army hospitals. Another large quota will be needed for hospitals to be completed in February. Six large Army general hospitals which will open early in March will require another 760 nurses. By June 30, 1941, it is planned to have 4,019 members of the Army Nurse Corps Reserve on extended active duty.
