## ANNUAL HOSPITAL DRIVE TO OPEN IN THIS SECTION

Mrs. F. V. Goodhart, chairman of the Centre County Hospital drive in this district met her committee

Monday evening to lay plans for contacting all the citizens of Centre Hall and Potter township to enroll them as members of the hospital corporation.

This drive throughout the county netted about \$7500 for the hospital last year but only \$7800 of that came from boroughs and townships outside the Bellefonte and State College districts. Centre Hall contributed \$13,550 and Potter township, \$108.

Last year patients from Centre Hall received free care for 103 hospital days costing the hospital \$345. The State appropriation and the local membership drive paid for part of this, but left an unpaid deficit of \$38.

Free hospital days for Potter Township last year amounted to \$82, costing the hospital \$350 over the amount of the drive and the State appropriation.

Mrs. Goodhart and her committee hope this year to enroll enough new members to pay the cost to the hospital of charity patients from this district.
