SENIORS TO GET ADVICE ON JOBS AT PENN STATE

With engineers greatly in demand, Seniors enrolled in engineering courses at the Pennsylvania State College will hear a series of lectures during the second semester based on professional practices and relationship that they will need to know after they are employed.
Dr. H. P. Hammond, dean of the College's School of Engineering, said that the remaining weekly lectures would be devoted entirely to post-employment problems. The preceding lectures dealt with the mechanics of getting a job, including interviews and letters. The lectures are given by engineers and industrial executives.
The demand for trained engineers far exceeds the supply at present, said Dean Hammond.

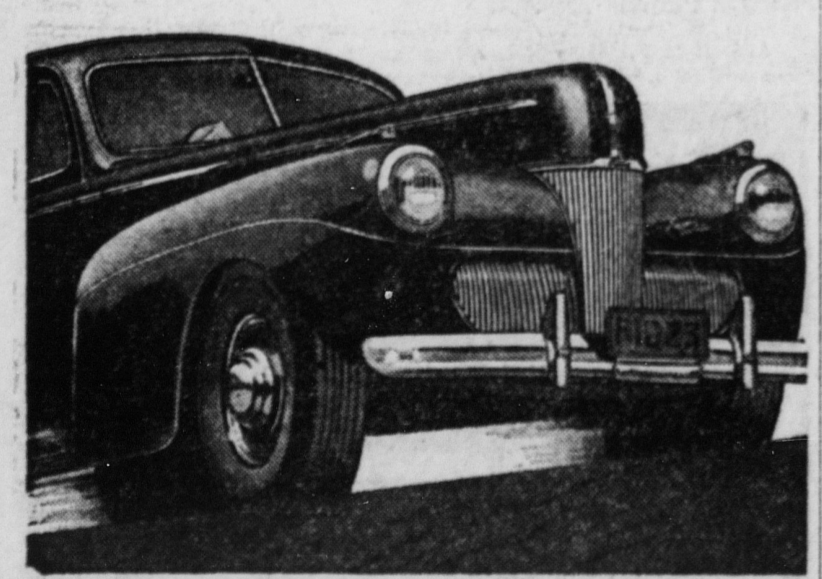
