ALL REGISTERED NURSES ARE SOUGHT IN SURVEY

During the past few weeks, approximately 5,000 registered nurses in Pennsylvania have received questionnaires from Mrs. Katherine Miller, R. N., special agent for the United States Public Health Service.

The U. S. Public Health Service, in collaboration with the three national nursing agencies, is sponsoring a national nursing inventory to find out where all the registered nurses are and what they are willing and able to do in the event of a national emergency.

"More than 15,000 nurses have already replied to the questionnaire," states Mrs. Miller, "and every mail brings in many more. It is heartening to find so many nurses willing and anxious to serve their country in the way they know best. Nurses who have been inactive in the profession for years, because of marriage or retirement, are expressing their desire to give either full or part-time service in their communities or wherever the need may be greatest."

Every registered nurse living in Pennsylvania, whether she is nursing now or not, regardless of which state she may be registered in, is to be included in the survey. Any such nurse who did not receive the questionnaire by February 15 will be sent one if she will drop a card to Mrs. Miller at 400 North Third Street, Harrisburg, Pa.
