FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders From The Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Select Adapted Corn—Seasonal adaptation is of most importance in selecting the seed of hybrid corn, according to agronomists of the Pennsylvania State College. Therefore farmers are urged to buy sparingly of any hybrid unless it has proved itself locally to be seasonally adapted, to beware of bargain prices, and to buy from reliable sources.

Take Inventory Now—This is the time to take inventory of such garden equipment as will be necessary for use in the flower garden, for the shrubbery border, or for the lawn. Ornamental horticulturists of the Pennsylvania State College suggest that garden arbors and arches probably can be dismantled and repaired also.

Reduce Orchard Erosion—Fruit specialists of the Pennsylvania State College have found that soil erosion can be reduced to a negligible point in peach orchards through the use of sods. However the soil must be deep enough if competition for moisture from the cover crop is not to check growth during severe drought.

Best Hogs To Grow—Basing their recommendations on experiments and market demands, livestock specialists of the Pennsylvania State College say that medium-type hogs feed out to better weight and quality than large or small type swine.

Increase Rooster Feed—If male birds in the breeding pens get thin because they cannot get enough feed from hoppers equipped with reels or grids, additional mash and grain may be supplied in open troughs placed along the wall where the females cannot reach them but the males can.
