Jacob Hess to New York to investigate the possibilities.

The fact that Cvek is a powerfully-built man, a sex delinquent as the Taylor slayer is believed to have been, and that he could have been in the vicinity of State College at the time of the crime because his hitch-hiking activities took in highways which pass through the community, were the reasons for the careful check being made.

Cvek confessed to the Bronx murder and other assaults after being confronted by the husband of one of his victims and by a few women whom he attacked.

The arrest came after police of Pennsylvania, New York, and New Jersey pieced together Cvek's long list of crimes and, using the description given by his victims, tracked him down in a cheap New York hotel.

He will be tried for first degree murder in the Bronx. The prosecutor is expected to ask for the death penalty.
