The estimated cost of the imrovements, \$350,000, is a conservative one, Mr. Magee stated, and is given as the minimum. There is a possibility that the final costs may exceed that figure considerably, he

which will begin as soon as engincering work now under way is completed, the payroll of the plant will be greatly increased. After the building program, the payroll is expected to approximate its present level of about 165 persons, exclusive of supervisory and office workers. Original plans were to have the new buildings and the remodeling operations completed in July, but because of defense priorities and the general heavy demands upon all materials, Mr. Magee declared that construction may be delayed to a considerable extent. The program will be completed as rapidly as possible, he said.

The present facilities are now operating at 100 per cent capacity. the works manager declared. He eslimated that the National Gypsum Company could absorb about 50 per cent more rotary kiln lime than can be produced at present.

The new rotary kiln, to be built parallel with the present one, will ct new records for size and contruction in the industry here. The giant tube will be 425 feet long-or 25 feet longer than the present one—and will be 8 feet in diameter throughout. The present kiln is 8 feet 6 inches in diameter for 300 feet and 7 feet in diameter for 100 oretical capacity of 227 tons of lime every 24 hours although, its working capacity will be approximately 200 tons-the same as the present kiln.

The giant tube will be fired with pulverized coal, will be equipped with a Raymond bowl pulverizer. and will have modern instrument and control equipment. Capacity of the mines is expect-

ed to be increased with the addition of new loading pockets, crushers and other mechanical equipment

All stone from the mine is conveyed to the surface on conveyor beits, through a sloping shaft.

The local plant of the National Gypsum Company will manufacture these lime products; pebble lime (chief product), pulverized lump lime, ground lime and hydrated lime. Stone products will include fluxing stone, highway stone, glass stone, mine dust and agricultural ground limestone.
