State College Girl Attacked

after having visited the home of a friend on Beaver avenue. As she neared the Earl Boal residence she saw a man approaching from the opposite direction. When the man reached her, he grabbed her by the throat, choked her and dragged her between two houses. The woman broke loose from his grasp and her screams attracted residents of the area. The man fled east on Beaver avenue to a cross street where he disappeared.

Mrs. Waite described him as wearing a light overcoat with belted back, and a soft hat pulled well down over the eyes. He didn't say a word during the struggle, it is reported.

After the attack, Mrs. Waite came to Bellefonte where she was examined by a local physician. Members of the family report that her throat was so badly bruised that it affected her speech temporarily, and that her feet were bruised where the assailant trampled upon them during the scuffle. One shoe also was torn, it was said.

The victim's father, J. S. Pettin-gill, former employe of a State College bakery, shortly after the Taylor murder last year told police that while he was driving between State College and Bellefonte early last March 28, he passed a large green sedan near the Houserville intersection, and that a few moments later, upon passing the Shiloh church, he saw a pile of snow in the road as though a car had difficulty in getting on the highway from a lane at the side of the church. Miss Taylor's baggage and other possessions were found in a field a few yards from the Shiloh church the next day, and it was generally believed that the green sedan used by Mr. Pettin-gill was the car used by the Taylor slayer.

State College's second incident happened about 10:45 o'clock Monday night when Grace Gray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Gray, of 436 West Nittany avenue, State College, and a senior at the State College High school, was approached and knocked down by an unknown man in the 300 block on West Nittany avenue.

According to members of the family, the assailant approached the girl suddenly from the rear, threw his arms around her neck and attempted to choke her. When the girl screamed he pushed her into the mud at the edge of the sidewalk, and fled. He was reported to have been seen running across the back yard of the D. L. Markle home by Robert L. Markle as he stepped outside of his home at the corner of Nittany avenue and Burrows street upon hearing the girl's screams.

Although Miss Gray did not get a good look at the man, Markle described him as being fairly tall and of slim build. He wore a grey coat, but no hat, he said. Miss Gray reported he had a hat pulled down over his eyes. Boats made casts of the man's footprints in the soft ground back of the Markle house. As in the first case, the assailant uttered no sound while he was struggling with his intended victim. None of the many victims of molestation

in Bellefonte ever heard the mysterious man speak.

In posting a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the attacker, Burgess Leitseh said that if he ever fails to obey a police order to halt, they have orders to shoot.

Council Discusses Airport Proposal

may be kept here indefinitely. He

declared that if a new type of radio beacon now being tested proves satisfactory, the range will not be moved from its present location.

Mr. Pew declared that the Bellefonte airport is on a par with most of the Federal government's intermediate fields, but that the new fields being established are larger. He added that if the borough takes over the Federal lease on the property, the buildings, boundary markers, lights and other equipment will be included in the transfer. The town, however, must agree to light and maintain the fields in operating condition, keep it open for public use, and report any defects which may appear in the field, such as cave-ins or soft spots. The government has no objections to a sub-lease, such as is contemplated with Mr. Noll, and Mr. Pew declared that the purpose of the entire plan is to provide a field in this locality for

the use of the air-traveling public. Mr. Noll reported that he had ordered a new \$2,000 Waco plane for use in the advanced training course he will launch as soon as he is able to use the field. He expressed doubt that he would be permitted to give advanced instructions if the airport is not made available to him.

One of the major obstacles to the transfer remaining to be cleared is in the matter of insurance. The government carried no insurance on the buildings, and if and when the field is turned over to Bellefonte insurance will be necessary to protect the borough's interests. This matter is to be investigated and a report is to be made in the near future.
