West Penn Co. Announces Rate Cut

Along with marked reductions, various classes of commercial customers also obtain simplified rate structures. Similar reductions are also made in the new church and school rates.

Commercial Cut Averages 12% The most commonly applied commercial schedule is Schedule "H," and every one of the 24,000 customers benefits from the change in varying amounts. The rate is improved as follows: Present schedule: 1st 50 kw. at 6c net; next 250 kw. at 4 1/2c net; additional at 1c net. New schedule: 1st 50 kw. at 5c net; next 300 kw. at 4c net; additional at 1c net. A smaller number of kw. will be added to the second block for larger loads resulting in a reduction in the demand charge.

Lower Rates For Homes While the rate reduction for residential customers individually is not great, it is estimated that 95% of the households on the company's lines will get a small reduction in their monthly bills. It will be remembered that this downward adjustment follows a series of substantial reductions in previous years, during which West Penn's rates have always been consistently low. During the past 25 years the top block rate has been cut in half, from 10c in 1916 to 5c with the new rate. The bottom block has decreased from 5c in 1916 to 1 3/4c now. Since 1914 the average price per kilowatt-hour for residential service, due to decreased rates and increased use, has declined from 9.7c to 3.7c, a decrease of 62%. The comparison of the present residential rate with the new rate follows: Present rate: first 25 kw. at 6c net; next 125 kw. at 3c; over 150 kw. at 1 3/4c. Minimum charge, \$1.00 net. Range users: 1 3/4c price applies to last 125 kw. after first 80 kw.

(Continued from page one) Council fixed the tax millage rate for 1941 at 15 mills—the same schedule as for 1940. The millage is divided as follows: 13 mills for general borough purposes, and 2 mills for interest and sinking fund. Councilmen, in discussing the tax rate, expressed regret that the millage could not be reduced, but claimed that a reduction at this time is not possible.
