the robbery, Graydon Anthony, night clerk at the hotel, was residing at the desk when a colored man entered the lobby, walked to the desk, pulled an automatic from his sleeve and said "This is a stick-up." Jamming the gun into the clerk's ribs he forced him back of the desk where the bandit scooped about \$21 from the hotel change drawer. Warning the clerk to remain quiet, the robber backed out of the lobby and fled.
Some months later, when Payne was arrested in Washington, D. C., suspicion pointed to him as the Phillipsburg robber. Anthony went to Washington, identified the suspect, and a detainer was lodged against him.
Police said that in the Washington institution Payne was a model prisoner and earned the maximum credit for good behavior. If his prison record is as good as Pittsburgh, his minimum will be up in three years and nine months, court attaches indicated.
