Sarah Ann's Cooking Class

Do you know that nutrition experts say we should serve potatoes at least once a day because they are an inexpensive source of certain minerals and vitamins? Take a little time and serve your potatoes attractively; the recipes will help you to serve them in different ways.

Baked Potatoes

Select smooth, medium sized potatoes. Wash with a vegetable brush, dry and place in a dripping pan. Prick the potatoes and bake 40 minutes in an oven and serve at once. If potato skins are to be eaten, rub the potatoes with butter or bacon fat before cooking.

Scalloped Potatoes With Pimentoes

4 cups diced potatoes.
1 bell pepper.
2 pimentoes.
Salt and pepper.
Cheese sauce.

Prepare and dice potatoes. Put in a sauce pan and cook until done. Drain, uncover and shake dry. Add the bell pepper and the pimentoes which have been chopped fine. Add salt and pepper to taste. Cover with cheese sauce. Bake 40 minutes in an oven 350 degrees.

Potato Fluff

Combine 3 cups well seasoned, mashed potato and 2 well-beaten egg yolks. Beat 2 egg whites stiff fold into mixture. Put in a baking dish and bake in an oven 375 degrees, for 10 minutes until light brown. Serve at once.

Creamed Potatoes With Chives

To 3 cups of seasoned, mashed potatoes, add 1/2 cup cream, paprika and 1 tablespoon melted butter, and salt. Put in a shallow baking dish and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon of chopped chives. Bake in a moderate oven until light brown. Serve hot.

Spiced Potato Muffin

2 cups flour.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.
1/2 cup butter.
3 tablespoons sugar.
1 egg.
1 cup mashed potatoes.
1 cup milk.

Mix and sift the flour, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Cream the butter, add the sugar. Cream. Add the egg, well beaten, and the potato. Blend well. To this add alternately, the flour mixture and the milk.

Pour into well-greased muffin tins and bake in an oven 400 degrees for 20 to 30 minutes.

Creamed Potatoes With Tomatoes

To 3 cups mashed potatoes, add 1/2 cup chopped and well-dried watercress. Pile on halved or thickly sliced tomatoes and brush with melted butter. Bake in an oven 400 degrees for 10 minutes.

Fried Potatoes

To 2 cups of seasoned, mashed potatoes, add 1 tablespoon of celery seed. Shape into strips 3 inches long and 1 inch wide. Dip into slightly beaten eggs, then roll in crushed cereal flakes. Fry in deep hot fat until brown. Drain on absorbent paper.

Parsley Potatoes

1 1/2 lbs. small new potatoes, boiled.
Melted butter.
1/2 cup finely chopped parsley.
Juice of 1/2 lemon.

Add lemon juice to butter and pour over potatoes. Roll potatoes in parsley.

French Fried Potatoes

Wash 6 potatoes, pare and cut in lengthwise strips. Soak in cold water 1 hour. Drain, dry thoroughly. Divide into 3 lots. Fry 1 lot at a time in deep hot fat until tender and delicately browned. Drain on brown paper. Heat fat to a higher temperature, return all potatoes to fat, using a frying basket and fry until crisp and brown, keeping the basket in motion. Drain on absorbent paper; sprinkle with salt.
