The Cloth of Sendony a play by Elizabeth H. Emerson was dramatized by the Youth Fellowship of the Trinity Evangelical-Reformed church Easter Sunday evening.

The story occurs in a room in the house of Joseph, just outside Jerusalem, during Passover week. The Cloth of Sendony to Joseph was a symbol of wealth and power. It filled his very life with selfishness and cowardice until in the supreme test he gave it as a burial cloth for his crucified Lord.
