Flying Evangelist and Family Killed

Had Learned to Fly While Holding Services in Lock Haven

Dan McNally, an evangelist who appeared at the Baptist church in Lock Haven last year, his wife, Dorothy, 27, and their daughter, Kathleen Maureen, 4, were killed Monday when their airplane crashed and burned at the Tri-City Airport at Binghamton, N. Y. A fourth passenger, Mary Wick, 37, Binghamton, suffered a fractured hip when she was thrown clear of the plane.

McNally became interested in flying when he was giving evangelistic services in Lock Haven last February. He learned to fly at the Lock Haven airport, and only last Saturday the family had visited in that city with Curt Wetzel and Howard Stage, before leaving for Binghamton. Mr. Wetzel was his instructor.

Sherm Lutz Regains Licenses As Pilot

Successfully passing rigorous physical and flight tests, Pilot Sherm Lutz, manager of the State College Air Depot, critically injured in a plane crash last August, last week had his licenses as instructor and as a pilot of trainer and passenger planes reinstated.

The permits were automatically revoked by the Civil Aeronautics Authority after the crash in which Charles Neyhart, 16-year-old student pilot of State College also was injured. The plane, a new machine, went out of control and fell near the Centre Hills Country Club, State College.

Brought to the Centre County Hospital, Lutz hovered between life and death for several weeks before he showed improvement. He suffered a broken jaw, badly broken arm, fracture and crush injuries to a hip and severe cuts and bruises. He was discharged from the hospital in December and since that time has been flying steadily as a passenger.
