JAMES WOODS.

James Woods, a resident of Osceola Mills, for the past 46 years, died at his home there Saturday morning, April 19, 1941, at 7 o'clock. Mr. Woods, who was born 79 years ago in Julian, Centre county, married the former Mary Parsons, married the former Mary Parsons, who survives him along with one daughter, Mrs. Mabel Koon, Johnstown. He was retired for a number of years; at one time he was employed by the Moshannon Coal Mining Co., of Osceola Mills. He was a member of the Methodist church. Funeral services were held from his late residence Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock in charge of the Rev. M. H. Crawford.

George L. Smith, of Easton, a native of Centre county, former resident of Bellefonte, and father of Miss Verna Smith, of East Bishop street, Bellefonte, died in an Easton hospital Wednesday night, April 16, 1941, of complications incident to advanced age. Mr. Smith, a retired carpenter, for many years was employed in the old Ardell planing mill in Bellefonte and the family resided in the house on East High street now occupied by the Heverly family. When the Smith family moved to Easton their daughter, Verna, remained in Bellefonte with the D. Paul Fortney family of East Bishop street. Mr. Smith was a brother of the late Jacob Smith of Bellefonte, and on May 30, last year, he and Mrs. Smith observed their 65th wedding anniversary. The deceased was born in Unionville on

July 13, 1855, making his age at time of death 85 years, 9 months and 3 days. He is survived by his wife, the former Ella Hanley, with whom he was united in marriage at Milesburg, and the following children: Miss Verna, Bellefonte; Mrs. Roydon Heckanour, Camden, N. J.; Mrs. Robert Heckanour, and Earl Smith, of Chester; Mrs. Harley Simmons and Wayne Smith, both of Easton. He was the last surviving member of his immediate family and was a member of the Lutheran church. Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at Easton, and interment was made in that city. Mr. Smith's daughter, Miss Verna Smith, went to Easton last Tuesday because of her father's illness, and was with him at the time of his death. She is expected to return to the Fortney home here sometime this week.

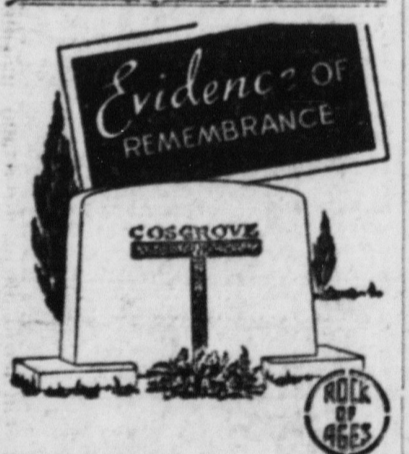
