## Holdup Case Closes With Third Arrest

Some weeks ago when Payne finished his sentence in Washington he was brought back to Centre county, where he finally admitted to participation in the robbery, but claimed he was not alone and named two accomplices, Cornelius Mason, 22, colored, of Clearfield, and Martin, who also then resided in the Clearfield area. After Payne had been sentenced to serve 4 to 8 years for his part in the crime, police continued their investigation.

They learned that Mason had been employed in the Hotel Philips barber shop, but failed to show up for work the day after the hold-up, and did not return to work anytime after that. They also learned that about 10 days after the crime, Mason went to Port Huron, Mich., to live with his brother. So several weeks ago police had Mason picked up in Port Huron, went out and brought him back to Centre county. He admitted that he was the "fin-german" and told Payne how to go about the holdup and where to find the money. Last week he was sentenced here to serve 4 to 8 years in prison.

Police then began a search for the third member of the group, and located Martin in Long Island. Brought back to this county, Martin for a time steadfastly maintained that his gun and his car were used the night of the robbery, but that he didn't know anything about the crime. He claimed Payne and Mason had told him the money had been won in a crap game.

The solution of the case is notable because of the absence of clues at first, and because no suspicion existed that more than one man participated.
