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Why Wheat Quota Is Needed

this country until the total supply for the 1941-42 marketing year is expected to be nearly one and a quarter billion bushels. This is almost enough wheat to meet this country's wheat needs for 2 years, the committee pointed out.

Another factor that has contributed to large wheat supplies is that the average person in the United States eats less wheat than formerly, they explained. In 1920 the consumption of wheat averaged 4.4 bushels per person, while in 1930 it was 4.1 bushels and only 3.7 bushels per person in 1939. Although the population has increased, the lower consumption per person has prevented any appreciable increase of the total consumption of wheat, the committee added.

The fact that the domestic market is not able to absorb the wheat grown in this country, coupled with the sharp curtailment of exports, are factors for wheat growers to study carefully before the marketing quota referendum on May 31, the committee pointed out.
