Centre County In Days of Yore

(Continued from page one) that town as the new county-seat. It is unfortunate that Aaronsburg did not even possess a streamlet.

Did you know that the first large plantation in Centre County of General James Potter near Old Fort—had slaves in it most of the work? Rev. Fithian the Presbyterian supply preacher, whom I wrote about last week, told of Mr. Potter having "four men servants; two boys. In Gen. Potter's will dated Oct. 27, 1789, we find that he left his son James (the judge) "his sword, riding furniture, his negro man Hero, and mulatto man Bob."

Early assessments list the following people as additional slave holders: In 1774, John McNeill and William McNeill of Potter township; in 1786, Benjamin Jordan and William King, also of Potter township; 1789, Isaac Pennington of Potter township, in 1790 Isaac Connelly of Baldwinsville township, in 1792 James Cook, Esq. of Harris township is assessed with two slaves. There were probably other slave owners but incomplete assessment lists prevented an accurate list being compiled. We do know that there were more slaves than listed in the above townships in Centre County (Mifflin county) advertised in 1900 as follows:

When Centre County was established in 1800 there were eighty nine colored people in its territory, but only two were listed as slaves. These belonged to Isaac Connelly, Esq. of Upper Bald Eagle or Spring township and David Gray of Haines township.

(Continued from page one) Crawls Through Window Charles G. Wilson, treasurer of the hardware company and occupant of the only apartment in the Dreisbach building, crawled through a second floor window to safety, after he heard the alarm. His furniture and clothing were lost. The explosion shattered windows throughout the center of the community. C. Elmer Moyer, president of the hardware fire, said, "I estimate that \$30,000 worth of hardware merchandise had been destroyed and \$80,000 would be required to replace the destroyed 80-year-old brick building. Insurance covered the losses."

Two Others in Hospital

Coroner William E. Roth, Union county, said no inquest would be held in the deaths of Stephens and Liddick. Physicians worked for two hours Sunday morning treating injuries and two volunteer firemen remain in the Evangelical Hospital. They are Kenneth Fisher, employee of the Dreisbach firm, and Raymond Jarrett, this place. Both suffered multiple lacerations, contusions and burns of the head and face and shock. They are reported in good condition.
