

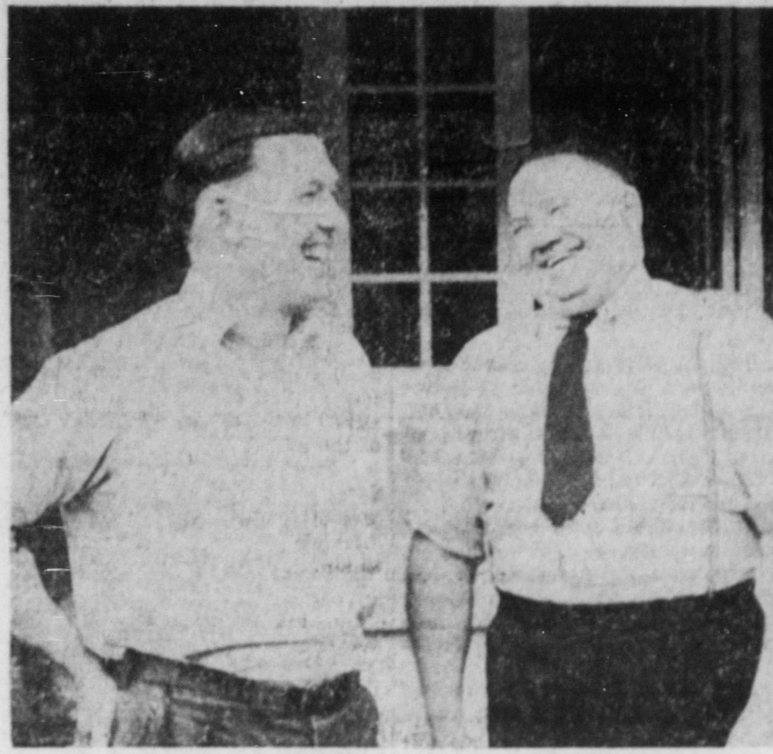

Farmers Face 3 Major Problems

"The Economic Problems of Agriculture" was the subject of an interesting discussion before members of the Bellefonte Kiwanis Club at Tuesday's meeting. The speaker was Dr. G. E. Brandow, Assistant Professor of Agricultural Economics at the Pennsylvania State College. There are three basic problems which underlie the symptoms of agricultural distress in our country, Dr. Brandow said. The most important of these is the same as that which affected the industrial and commercial fields as well during the thirties, the depression. This created a low purchasing power and consequently low farm prices. The farmer continued to produce, as was necessary, but suffered great hindrance to the farmer's obtaining an income sufficient for a good standard of living is gradually disappearing under the rising tide of employment in industry. However, if the war boom breaks, the problem will again fall into the farmer's lap.

Prof. M. M. Garver Enthusiasm At Dies at College Women's Meeting

Death Claims Civil War Veteran, College Faculty Member; Was 93
Prof. Madison M. Garver, one of Centre county's few remaining Civil War veterans and retired professor of physics at Penn State, died at the home of his son, David B., at the Evergreens, near State College, early Sunday morning, May 11, 1941. Professor Garver, who was 93 years, 5 months, and 29 days old at the time of his death, had been ill since August, 1937, when he suffered a broken hip in a fall on the porch stairs of his home. He went to the College in 1863 as assistant professor of physics. He later was named an associate professor until 1925 when he became librarian of the School of Chemistry and Physics. M. M. Garver was born on a farm near Scotland, Pa., November 12, 1847, a son of Samuel and Elizabeth Moore Garver. He is survived by a son, David B., and two sisters, Mrs. Flora Buckline, of Long Beach, Calif., and Miss Clara Garver, of Los Angeles, Calif. His wife, the former Rose Martin, whom he married in 1884, died on March 21, 1934. Funeral services were held from Koch's Funeral Home, State College, Tuesday afternoon, with the Rev. J. F. Anglers Jam Paradise Mothers' Club Officers Named

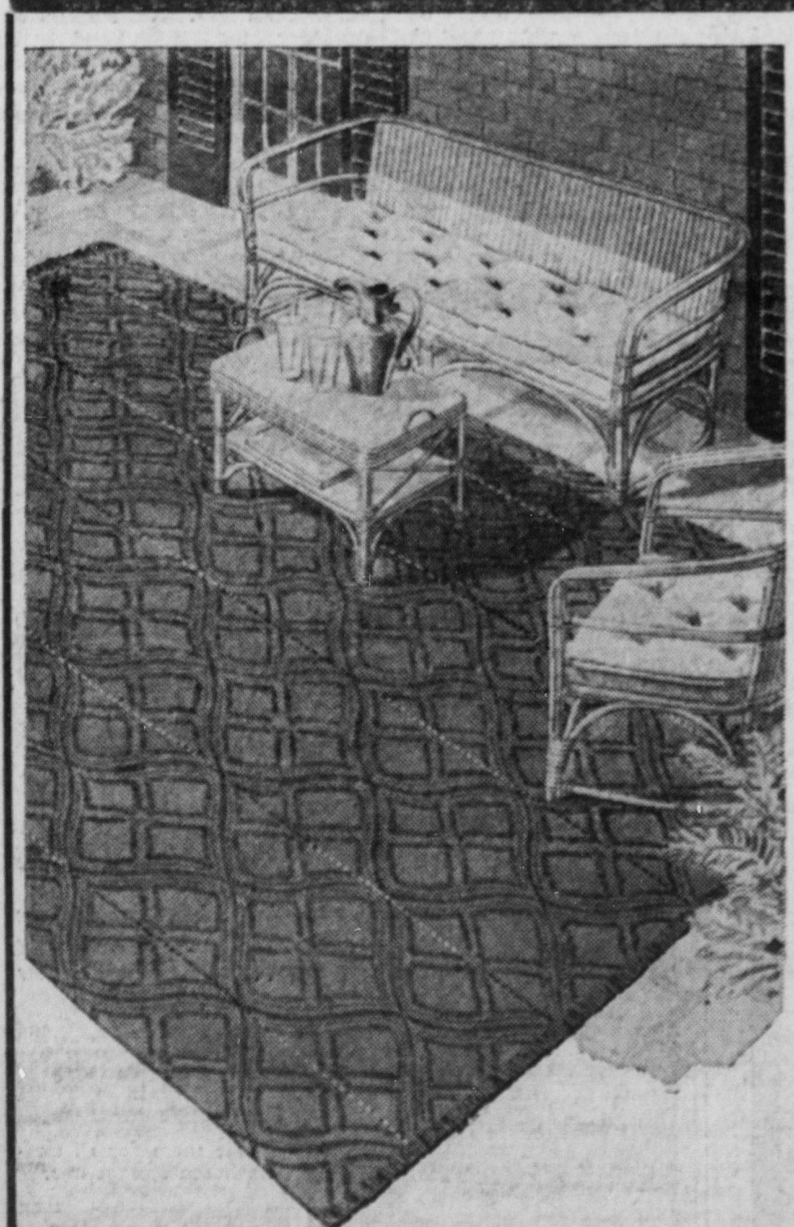
Mrs. Millard Hartswick Chosen President; Cooking School Scheduled in June
Mrs. Willard Hartswick was elected president of the Bellefonte Mothers' Club at the annual organization meeting of that group Monday night. The session was held at the home of Mrs. Charles E. Martin, on East Curtin street, with Mrs. Paul M. Corman and Mrs. Ted Harris as co-hostesses. Other officers chosen were: Mrs. Charles Martin, first vice president; Mrs. Grover Corman, second vice president, and Mrs. Lela A. Olson, re-elected secretary and treasurer. The principal speaker was Miss LaVerne Strong, of the Department of Education and Psychology at Penn State who spoke on corrective reading. Miss Strong declared that reading involves four processes; recognition, comprehension, interpretation and application, and that unless these processes are properly applied, the reader fails to get full benefit from reading. She sketched the history of reading and outlined ways in which reading habits may be improved. Mrs. Edward R. Miller, reporting upon the baby clinic which recently was moved to new quarters in the White building, West High street, noted that in April a total of 42 babies, including 8 new ones, were examined. Plans are continuing for the cooking school to be held here the last two Thursdays in June by Miss Kaylor, of Ebensburg, who will demonstrate how the cheaper foods can be prepared in an attractive manner. The classes will be conducted in the former A. & P. store room on the Diamond, under the sponsorship of the Mother's Club. Mrs. Millard Hartswick was named chairman of a committee consisting of Mrs. Lynn Fromm and Mrs. Edward R. Miller, to arrange the program for the June meeting of the club.
