Mifflin County To Unveil Marker

Scenic and Historic Shrine to Be Dedicated Friday, May 16

Friday, May 16, Mifflin county will dedicate a scenic and historic shrine and unveil a marker, both reminiscent of trans-State transportation systems of a century and more ago. The dedication will be that of the Jacks Creek Stone Arch Bridge park just off Route 22 as it enters Lewistown from the east.

The bridge carried the early stage coach lines between Harrisburg and Pittsburgh via Lewistown and Huntingdon, and was part of the first turnpike along the Juniata River. By 1829 the stage lines and turnpikes had a rival for trans-state transportation in the Penna. Canal which that year reached Lewistown.
