SUMMER COURSE IN VOCATIONS AT COLLEGE

Problems arising in vocational education for national defense will play a prominent part in an advanced vocational education course to be offered during the main summer session at the Pennsylvania State College from June 30 to August 8.

The course, open to high school teachers and to instructors in the current defense training programs, will be directed by Dr. L. H. Dennis, executive secretary, American Vocational Association, and Dr. B. H. Van Oot, state director of vocational education in Virginia.

Other features of the main summer term will include the second annual Pennsylvania Workshop, the institute of French education, the library school, and the band, orchestra and chorus school for music supervisors and students.

Sunday School Lesson

BROADENING CHRISTIAN HORIZONS

International Sunday School Lesson for June 1, 1941.

Golden Text: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel; for it is the power of God unto Salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."—Rom. 1: 16.

Lesson Text: Acts 11: 19-36. The persecution which followed the martyrdom of Stephen caused the disciples to flee from Jerusalem.

The Christians who fled from Jerusalem to Antioch first preached the doctrine of the new faith to Jews only. Then they took a forward step and began preaching to the Greeks in Antioch, as well.

Fifteen years of the Christian era had passed and Antioch was to become the second birthplace of Christianity through its vision and wisdom in sponsoring the first missionary program of the new faith.

Leadership in the Antioch church was in the hands of five men, named in the first verse of the thirteenth chapter, including Barnabas and Saul, Barnabas, after witnessing the activity of the Christian believers in Antioch, had remained in that city and became a part of this religious movement.
